UEHRD leads preparation to receive displaced persons in Rakhine State

THE Union Enterprise for Humanitarian Assistance, Resettlement and Development in Rakhine (UEHRD) is leading the process of accepting and resettling persons displaced by terrorist activities and development works and has prepared three repatriation and assessment camps to resettle ethnic nationals, Hindus and Muslims.

Houses as well as schools and a monastery for local ethnic nationals were being built by states and regions governments, the Ministry of Border Affairs, the Tatmadaw, the Daw Khin Kyi Foundation and donors in Thittonenar Gwa Sone (Mro) village, Khontaing (Mro) village, Zawmatet group, Padaka new village, the Aungsitpyin group beside Taungpyo road, Fawtitaung (Maramar) former village, Thet Taing Nya (Thet) former village, Aungthabyay village, Auk Pyuma and near Khamaungseik town.

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Employers, employees voice objections to proposed minimum wage

SOME employers and employees are expressing strong opposition to the proposed minimum wage of Ks4,800 announced on 2nd January.

“There were objection reports individually or collectively submitted to the Ministry of

Labour, Immigration and Population under the prescribed procedures”, said U Naw Aung, the labour representative of the National Committee on Minimum Wage.

Through respective region and state committees, employers and labourers are allowed to oppose the proposed minimum

wage within 60 days after its announcement. The government will make negotiations with the employers and workers who can give logical reasons for their opposition.

The employers said they will face difficulties if the minimum wage goes above Ks4,000. But labourers requested that

they can do well only with a minimum wage of Ks5,600.

“A bunch of watercress sells for Ks200-300. Additionally, a viss (1.6 kg) of onions fetches over Ks3,000. We can live a normal life only with minimum wages of Ks5,600 on account of increasing commodity prices.

The Vice President and his delegation returned to Nay Pyi Taw at 3 p.m. and was welcomed by deputy ministers Rear-Admiral Myint Nwe, Maj-Gen Than Htut, U Kyaw Myo, U Win Maw Tun and other officials at the Nay Pyi Taw International Airport.

China, Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar, Thailand and Viet Nam are member countries in the Mekong-Lancang Cooperation (MLC), which is a programme for political, security, economic and social cooperation in the Mekong region.

MLC was initiated on 13 November, 2014, at the Asean-China summit meeting held in Nay Pyi Taw for cooperation among the Mekong-Lancang region countries for sustainable develop-

ment in the Mekong-Lancang region and was fully established in 2016.

The aim of the MLC is to support the socio-economic development of countries in the region, increase the livelihood of the people, reduce development disparities, support the establishment of the Asean

community, increase the implementation of the 2030 United Nations sustainable development goals, and increase cooperation among developing countries and China by setting up a MLC cooperation fund of US\$300 to implement the cooperation projects.

At the second Lan-

cang-Mekong Cooperation Leaders' Meeting, a Phnom Penh proclamation was issued and a five-year action plan (2018-2022) to implement 214 cooperation projects among the Mekong-Lancang countries, including 10 projects in Myanmar, was approved.— Myanmar News Agency ■

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Houses for Muslims were also built in villages. Preparation works were completed and responsible personnel from all levels were ensuring that everything is ready for the acceptance and repatriation works, it is learnt.

Meanwhile, authorities have started the land work to construct buildings that will accommodate refugees repatriated from Bangladesh in Hlaphoekhaung Village in Maungtaw District yesterday.

The work was launched on 7 January by pressing into service eight backhoes and four bulldozers.

The refugees will be temporarily housed in the buildings after their citizenship is scrutinised.

"Those who return from Bangladesh will be scrutinised at Ngakhuya and Taungpyolatwe, and they will be provided with temporary accommodation here," said U Ye Htut, Maungtaw district deputy commissioner.— Myanmar News Agency ■

Korea-Myanmar friendship bridge (Dala) project launched

THE Korea-Myanmar friendship bridge (Dala) project, linking downtown Yangon to the under-developed Dala Township, will begin construction in April 2018.

The groundbreaking ceremony is expected to take place in the first week of March, while the project will be completed in the 2020-2021 fiscal year. The government has also paid the rental fees and compensation

for the lands acquired for the bridge construction project from the 2015-2016 to 2016-2017 fiscal years.

The friendship bridge will be a cable-stayed bridge. It will be 1,936 feet long, extending from Phone Gyi Street in Lanmadaw Township on the Yangon side to Bo Min Yaung Street on the other side of the Yangon river. The bridge will be 87 feet wide and 320 feet high to allow large

passenger ships to pass underneath. It will also feature two 500-millimetre water pump lines.

Major construction work will also take place on two other sections: a 2,026-foot-long bridge at one end on the Yangon side and a 25,182-foot-long bridge at the other end on the Dala side.

The Korea-Myanmar Friendship Bridge is estimated to cost \$168.173 million. The Korea Economic Development

Cooperation Fund will provide an Economic Development Cooperation Fund loan of \$137.833 million, while the Union government will fund the remaining \$30.341 million.

Upon completion of the bridge, it will contribute to the socio-economic development of the local people living in the Dala, Twantay, Kawhmu, Kungyangon and Ayeyawady regions.—Naing Lin Kyaw (Dala) ■

Food from hospital eateries pass FDA test

THE Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has found the laboratory test results of food samples collected from stalls inside the Yangon General Hospital compound to be satisfactory, according to a report in the Myawady Daily yesterday.

A combined team, including

an official from the FDA and the west district FDA committee, inspected the food stalls on December 21 and took samples of the food. Laboratory testing uncovered formalin in the noodles, and the complete results are expected to be released soon. Apart from the discovery of for-

malin, the results are otherwise satisfactory, an official said.

Formalin, which is used to preserve human bodies, is often misused to extend the shelf life of bean curd, noodles, seafood, and milk and dairy products. Sustained and excessive consumption of the chemical can

cause stomach cramps, nausea, fainting, renal failure and even death.

The Yangon region has some 83 hospitals, including 14 specialty hospitals, three teaching hospitals, two 500-bed hospitals, four 200-bed hospitals and one 100-bed hospital.—GNLM ■

Ministry to build 4 bridges to aid local commodity flow

THE ministry of construction is planning to build four bridges to facilitate the smooth flow of local commodities in the 2018-2019 fiscal year (FY), according to a report in the Myawady Daily yesterday.

The four bridges are Tha Kan Bridge and Set Hsan Bridge on the Pyapon-Bogale-Am-

ar Road and Saw Kae Bridge and Jyun Pya Thet Bridge on the Mawlamyinegyun-Wake-ma-Myaungmya Road.

The bridges will be more than 240,000 feet long. Each bridge will be 24 feet wide, flanked by 3.3-foot-wide pedestrian walkways, while the clearance will be 40 feet high and

more than 200 feet wide.

Upon completion of the Saw Kae and Jyun Pya Thet bridges, the transport of goods between Labutta District, Mawlamyinegyun, Pyapon District, Bogale, Set Hsan, Amar and Pathein will be smoother.

In 2017, the ministry had constructed a temporary bridge

on the Mawlamyinegyun-Bogale road, which had reduced travel time between Yangon and Maubin. Upon completion of these bridges, 26 townships in the Ayeyawady Delta will be accessible by a motor road, making it easier for the local people to transport their products to Yangon.—GNLM ■

External trade income rose by \$3.99 billion this FY

MYANMAR'S external trade with foreign countries between 1 April and 29 December in the current fiscal year (FY) reached US\$24 billion, up by \$3.99 billion compared with the same period last year.

This includes an estimated \$10.4 billion in exports and \$13.6 billion in imports, resulting in a trade deficit of \$3.99 billion.

Agro products, animal products, fisheries, forest products, minerals and finished industrial goods, among other

things, are shipped to foreign countries. The export earnings, as of 29 December, increased by \$1.9 billion this FY.

Capital goods such as auto parts, vehicles, machines, steel and airplane parts are imported. The private sector showed an income decrease of \$147 million against last FY, whereas the public sector saw an increase of \$271 million.

Intermediate goods make up most of the imports, with petroleum products and plastic

raw materials being the main import items. The import value of raw materials is up by \$1.4 billion against last FY.

Consumer products such as pharmaceuticals, cosmetics and palm oil are also flowing into the market, showing an increase of \$511 million against last FY.

Trade via the sea route brought in \$18.1 billion, whereas border trade earned \$5.8 billion, according to statistics from the Commerce Ministry. —Htet Myat ■

Bilateral trade with India hits over \$939 million this FY

MYANMAR'S bilateral trade with the second most populous country, India, in the first seven months of the current fiscal year (FY) reached more than US\$939 million, including \$477 million in exports and \$461 million in imports.

During this period, its trade via the sea route brought in more than \$900 million, while the Indo-Myanmar border trade value was some \$38.5 million. Myanmar carries out bor-

der trade with India through the Reed and Tamu checkpoints. Myanmar primarily imports pharmaceuticals from India, while it is the main buyer of Myanmar's pulses. Betel nuts, elephant foot yams, spices, cement, footwear, blankets, snack foods, apparel, cigarettes, apples, mangoes, coconuts, beverages, soap and canned fish, among other things, are also exported to India. The country's trade value

with India was some \$1.94 billion in FY 2016-2017, \$1.71 billion in FY 2015-16, \$1.34 billion in FY 2014-2015, \$1.63 billion in FY 2013-2014 and \$1.37 billion in FY 2011-2012. The current FY has seen three foreign investment projects from India, with an estimated capital of \$10 million, according to the statistics provided by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration.—Ko Khant ■

The first day event held in Yangon saw nearly 80000 visitors coming to the festival, with over 90000 visitors coming in the following two days, it was learnt.

Performances of Myanmar National Human Rights Commission

ALL human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. Every individual can enjoy equal rights and freedom, without segregation. No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment. No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each State. Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion. Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person. These are all described in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Formation of MNHRC

With a view to upgrading fundamental rights of Myanmar citizens and protecting human rights, MNHRC was formed in September, 2014, consisting of 11 members whereas the commission started to run its operation with the chairman, vice-chairman and five other members, 7 in all, starting from 6th October 2016. The commission is made up of 5 departments—department of up-gradation and education of human rights, department of protection of human rights, legislative department, administration department, international relation department and management and finance department. Performances of the MNHRC include making trips across the nation for educational sharing, dealing with letters of complaints and issues, making surveys on the ground, if there happened in the areas, important matters and inspecting penitentiaries and custodies.

Upgrading education and process of protection

In the year 2017, MNHRC made talk shows on sharing educational knowledge in 15 townships including Puta-O, Machanbaw, Kawlin, Wuntho, Maiyaung and Maisat. In the National Defense University as well, subjects on human rights had already been conducted to high-ranking Tatmadaw officials for four times. Similarly,

trainings on human rights were conducted in other military institutes and camps. In the year 2017 similar trainings were conducted to police officers in Yangon and Magwe Regions and Kachin State.

Educational talk shows were held in the Ministries, 40 ministries in 2015 and 34 ministries in 2017. In the Central Institute of Civil Services as well, a total of over 30000 staff were given trainings for 72 times. Workshops for region and state-level officials were also held in 7 states in 2014, 7 regions and Union Region [Nay Pyi Taw] in 2015 and 4 districts in 2017.

Village and ward-based workshops

In 2015 village or ward based workshops were held for 14 times, with 2 workshops held for officers of penitentiaries. In 2017, 2 workshops were held for women's organizations, one workshop on human rights on children in co-sponsorship with the Education Ministry and similar workshop for City Development Police Forces.

In 2016 8 penitentiaries and 5 inmate labor camps—13 in all were inspected, with 28 prisons and 24 inmate labor camps inspected in 2017. In inspecting penitentiaries, Buthidaung prison was inspected for three times.

Inspection of penitentiaries

While inspecting the prisons, inmates were allowed to frankly submit their difficulties and violations of human rights in the back of prison staff. As a result, 320 from prisons and 133 from labor camps—453 reports had been tendered. In 2017 48 police custodies, 45 custodies of courts of justice and 12 custodies in hospital were inspected.

Investigation on the ground situation

According to complaints as well as information from news media and posted in social media such as face-book the commission made surveys on the ground for investigation. In 2017 23 on-the-ground-investigations were made, with 16 complaints included. Very recently, the commission managed to rescue two children tortured by the victim's father in Danubyu, just upon receipt of the news posted in face-book.

Making trips to Rakhine State for investigation

MNHRC made 16 trips to Rakhine State for investigations on the ground due to the complaints, inspecting two more times in Maungtaw region, Rakhine State in 2017 according to

the needs. During the first trip, the commission studied as to whether national ethnic people or Bengalis were being violated of human rights, finding out that Mro, Khami, Daingnet and Hindus were atrociously slaughtered by terrorists. Concerning this, news and information were made known to the people.

During the second trip to Sit-twe, Buthidaung and Maungtaw in December, 2017 the commission studied situations on the arrangement of accepting Bengalis who would return from the neighboring country and refugee camps accommodating Hindu nationals who did not yet go back to their original locations. In addition to this, the commission visited the safer sites for building new housing estates for Mro, Daingnet and Khami nationals whose house were burnt down by terrorists.

Cases mostly complained to the MNHRC

In 2016, a total of 611 letters of complaints were received by MNHRC, with 414 letters of complaints received in 2017. Out of them, 276 complaints were to be submitted to the respective Ministries. 112 letters included letters with unclear descriptions of the cases, some to be dealt

tions of custodies at hospitals two times made respectively.

In 2016 the commission had chances to meet 115 inmates only whereas it could meet 453 inmates in 2017. Regarding surveys the amounts of trips increased up to four times—6 trips in 2016 and 23 trips in 2017. In answer to the announcements in radios, TVs and newspapers that complaints can be sent to the commission, people trust in the commission more than ever; acquiring cooperation from Union Ministries and Region and State Governments.

Complaints can be sent

If any became a victim of human rights violation he can tender a letter of complaint to MNHRC. If a citizen became a victim of civilian rights entrusted by the Constitution or a victim of human rights described in the universal declaration of human rights or a victim of human rights included in the agreement of women's rights on sex segregation, agreement of human rights on children and agreement of human rights on the disabled persons, the person in question or by proxy can send a letter of complaint to the following address—chairman, MNHRC, NO/27, Pyay Road 6 1/2 mile, Hlaing township, Yangon in person or email address—protection@mnhrc.org.mm describing the following facts:

- 1/ complainant's name, address and contact numbers (line ph or mobile ph)
 - 2/ complainant by proxy [describing in detail about the victim [if needed- photos, video file or audio file and other evidences attached]
 - 3/ affidavit letter and signature
- Complaints not to be investigated by the Commission
- Cases sued in a court of justice
 - Cases under trial/appeal in a court of justice
 - Cases in which final decrees had been decided by a court of justice.

Advantages and disadvantages among 2016-2017 performances

Compared to previous years, progress had been made to considerate extent. Inspections of penitentiaries in 2017 were made three times of what was done in 2016. Inspections of inmate labor camps were made nearly five times, with inspections of custodies at courts of justice nine times and inspec-

Employers, employees voice objections to proposed minimum wages

This rate is only for individual survival, not including family expenditure. Those migrant workers from towns other than Yangon have to spend their money on accommodations and other charges”, said Ma Hla Hla, a member of the labour union of the Hlainethaya Industrial Zone.

Disapproval letters can be submitted to the respective committees by 16th January, bearing the signatures of the workers. They also request that a minimum wage of Ks5,600 should also have impact on enterprises with more than five workers instead of those businesses with ten.

“Despite 60-days due date, we received directives that disagreement letters have to be sent within two weeks. This is another question which comes out”, said Ma Hla Hla.

U Aye Thaung, chairman of Shwelinpan Industrial Park, said that this set rate cannot affect all sectors but employers engaged in garment enterprises using the Cutting, Making and Packaging (CMP) system will be faced with difficulties. Factories making branded products will not matter even if they have to offer more than the set rate. Employers as well as employees have their own difficulties.

The government called on feedback from the employers regarding business operation in industrial zones. There is still no response received from them, said U Aye Thaung.

“Some employers are not strongly disapproving of the proposed minimum wage, but they want the government to tackle problems of high transportation, insufficient electric supply, delays in working with

the cabinets, and tax imposition”, he continued.

“If minimum labour wages are set at a high rate, it will slow the country’s economy, making the foreign investors hesitate over investment. If the rate is too low, it will force local workers to migrate to foreign countries and this will also hurt the country’s economy. The government needs to handle this carefully while endeavouring to improve the ease of doing business ranking that is observed by the World Bank. A moderate rate needs to be set”, said U Win Zaw, a member of the National Committee on Minimum Wage.

U Thein Swe, Union Minister for Labour, Immigration and Population, said at a recent regular meeting between Vice President 1 and businessmen that this proposed rate is decided on commodity price, exchange

rate, Gross Domestic Product and inflation, along with wages set in neighbouring countries. They listened to the employers and employees from regions and states.

“We do not want to hurt any of them due to this proposed rate”, he said.

“We want the businessmen to do well and have the labourers in a happy work environment”, said he added.

Daw Khine Khine Nwe, the joint general secretary of Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry reported that SMEs play a vital role in driving Myanmar’s economy. Most of the SMEs do not earn foreign currency. The current prevailing exchange rate increases by 12 per cent against 2015’s FX. Meanwhile, the minimum wages is up by 33 per cent compared to that of 2015. If min-

imum wages exceed Ks4,000, it might triggers changes in labor force and work environment.

Previously, opposition and objection between employers and employees came out when a minimum wage of Ks3,600 was set. The government explained the economic climate of the country and they finally accepted the set rate.

“We hope the government will handle it well this time”, said some members of National Committee on Minimum Wage.

After this proposed minimum wage is approved, workers will be paid at the set rate. New, inexperienced workers during a three-month training period (before the probation period) will be paid not less than 50 per cent of minimum wages. Those labourers during the three-month probation period will receive 75 per cent of minimum wages.

Phase 1 of JICA SME two-step loan project implemented

SMALL and medium enterprises (SMEs) are responsible for 99 per cent of the country’s development. With the development of SMEs, people will have more job opportunities and individual incomes will also increase.

The Myanmar Economic Bank has implemented phase 1 of the two-step loan project for SMEs. Earlier, it obtained an official development assistance loan from Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) to provide financial assistance to SMEs in the country.

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Emergency PPST meeting held to resolve disagreements in national-level political dialogue preparation process stages

An emergency meeting of the Peace Process Steering Team (PPST), including eight ethnic armed organisations that have signed the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (NCA), was held in Khumphucome Hotel, Chiang Mai, Thailand, yesterday morning.

Kayin Nation Union Chairperson Saw Mutu Sae Poe said the emergency meeting was held to resolve differences among the ethnic armed organisations and the government on the national-level political dialogue preparation process stages conducted for the Union Peace Conference – 21st Century Panglong 3rd Session.

In his opening remarks, Saw Mutu Sae Poe said, “All the stakeholders had agreed to participate in the out-of-parliament path, a political dialogue path based on NCA to reconstruct the country. This is a new political culture called implementation, based on finding solutions through dialogue. Meetings with the public and national-level political discussions are the backbone of the new political culture. This will help in the implementation of national reconciliation. The

peace process cannot be implemented through the system of orders and obedience but by building trust, based on mutual respect and recognition. Thus stakeholders need to discuss to obtain a common understanding. The meeting will be significant only when solutions are found after discussing the fears of both sides about the other.”

The day's PPST emergen-

cy meeting was attended by top PPST leaders, as well as members of the group for security and political discussions, and officials from the Joint Monitoring Committee.

Based on the experience of armed conflict, the highest level of confrontation in a political situation, it is undeniable that mistrust, suspicion and concerns between the main stakeholders

participating in the peace process are deeply rooted. This causes friction when political dialogues are held. It can be concluded that they do not view the terms of the NCA in the same way. As such, a solution needs to be found through meetings and discussions, said Saw Mutu Sae Poe.

The PPST emergency meeting will be held over two days on January 11 and 12. ■

Kayin State receives more visitors

THE number of visitors to Kayin State increased in the 2016-2017 fiscal year. Residents of Kayin State, located in southeastern Myanmar, are primarily descended from the Kayin race and other minority ethnic groups.

Tourist arrivals in Kayin State have increased annually. Authorities have upgraded the roads and bridges in the state, which are now open 24 hours. Tourists can visit Hpa-an from Yangon and return in a day.

In 2016, Kayin State received some 159,749 visitors. As of December 2017, some 225,311 visitors visited Kayin State. Most of the foreigners who visited Kayin State were from France, Germany, the Netherlands and China, according to the Hpa-an branch office of the hotels and tourism department.

During peak season, many tourists visit Hpa-an, the capital of Kayin State. Mount Zwegabin, Kyauk Kalap, Paddanya Cave, Saddan Cave, Kawt Gun Cave, Bayit Nyi Naung Cave, Kawkath-aung Cave and Hot Spring are famous tourist spots in the state.—Min Thu ■

Dredging Chindwin River to be launched in February

SAGAING Region Government is planning to dredge the Chindwin River clearing debris including trees and big roots that were brought by the river to its floor in the rainy season.

“The move is aimed at preventing dangers to ships in summer when the water level decreases,” said U Tin Aung Tun, Assistant Director of the Sagaing Region Department for Water

Resource and Development of River System. The work would be carried out between Homelin and Monywa in February, he added. In 2016, about 35 trees and roots weighing 55 tons in total were removed from the floor of the river between Homelin and Monywa from January to March in 2016, and 35 trees and roots in the same area last year.—Win Oo (Zeya Taing) ■



Mandalay traffic accidents kill over 700 people in 2017

TRAFFIC accidents have killed more than 700 people in the Mandalay region in 2017, the traffic police from No. 14 Mandalay branch office have stated, according to a report in City News yesterday.

The traffic police announced that some 2,233 traffic accidents occurred in 2017, killing 789 persons and injuring 3,565 others.

“Motorbikes are widely

used in Mandalay. Therefore, most of the cases involve motorbikes crashing into people or colliding with each other. Some people ride motorbikes after consuming alcohol. Even a small amount of alcohol can lead to harmful situations,” said U Lon Maung, a resident in the Chanmyathasi township.

“Traffic accidents can be reduced if traffic rules are obeyed,” he added.

The Mandalay region has recorded some 2,233 cases of traffic accidents, including 559 cases in Pyin Oo Lwin District and 421 cases in Kyaukse District. To reduce road accidents, the traffic police are conducting regular awareness talks and distributing pamphlets. The traffic police have filed charges against suspected reckless drivers under sections 279, 337, 338 and 304 (A) of the Penal Code.—GNLM

Yaba worth Ks20 million seized in Katha

Acting on a tip, police apprehended a Myanmar citizen, Min Set, for alleged contact with drug dealers, in Indaw Township, Katha, yesterday.

A combined team of officers and other staff searched the suspect's tent

near Shwebo-Myikyina Road, Kyin Chaung Village, Indaw Township, and found four soap boxes filled with heroin, weighing 29 grams, and 3,407 Yaba tablets, worth more than Ks19 million.

The team also apprehend-

ed a 27-year-old man, identified as Tun Win Aung, along with his host. The police have filed charges against the suspects under sections 15, 19-A, 21 of the Anti-Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.—Aye Lwin (Katha) ■

Death toll rises to 17 in California mudslides, 17 missing

SANTA BARBARA, (Calif.) — The death toll from devastating mudslides in affluent communities along a stretch of Southern California coastline rose to 17 on Wednesday after two more bodies were recovered, the local sheriff said, and the number of people missing also climbed to 17.

The two additional fatalities were discovered as some 500 rescuers using search dogs, helicopters and thermal-imaging equipment dug through waist-deep mud for victims or survivors of the mudslides, which were triggered by a heavy downpour early on Tuesday.

Three more people were rescued from the path of debris on Wednesday. None of the dead have been publicly identified.

“We realize that this

is going to be a long and difficult journey for all of us and our community,” Santa Barbara County Sheriff Bill Brown told reporters at a late afternoon news conference.

The walls of mud that

roared through foothills and valleys sandwiched between the Pacific Ocean and the sprawling Los Padres National Forest also destroyed 100 single-family homes, damaged hundreds of other buildings

and injured 28 people, said Amber Anderson, a spokeswoman for the Santa Barbara County Fire Department.

A major north-south highway along the coast, US Route 101, was closed

in both directions and not expected to reopen until next week.

Among the damaged properties were historic hotels and the homes of celebrities including television personality Oprah Winfrey and talk-show host Ellen DeGeneres, who both live in the upscale hillside community of Montecito, known for its natural beauty and proximity to Los Angeles.

Verdant hillsides that had provided estates with a sense of seclusion were largely denuded by last month’s historic wildfires, making them vulnerable to the massive mud and debris slides that sent boulders crashing into homes, turned highways into raging rivers and shredded cars into tangles of metal.—Reuters ■

Beijing winning pollution battle as other Chinese cities fall behind

BEIJING — As Beijing and the surrounding region reported big improvements in air quality last year, nationwide gains were much more muted as industrial activity shifted further away from the capital, a report by Greenpeace shows.

Strict restrictions on coal use and industrial activity led to a dramatic improvement in air quality in Beijing and across northern China, helped also by favorable weather conditions.

China as a whole, however, cut air pollution levels by just 4.5 percent last year, according to the most often-cited measure, which was the smallest decline since 2013 as industry ramped up coal, cement and steel production, Greenpeace said in a report on China air pollution published on Thursday.

A separate Reuters analysis of official government readings of concentrations of small, breathable particles known as PM2.5 also showed a disparity between Beijing and 27 nearby cities included in a pollution action plan and those just outside the zone.—Reuters ■

Regulator urges release of treated Fukushima radioactive water into sea

NARAHA, (Japan) — The chief of Japan’s nuclear regulator said Thursday water at the crisis-hit Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant that contains radioactive tritium even after being treated should be released into the sea after dilution.

“We will face a new challenge if a decision (about the release) is not made within this year,” Nuclear Regulation Authority Chairman Toyoshi Fuketa told a local mayor, referring

to the more than 1 million tons of coolant water and groundwater that has accumulated at the facility crippled by the 2011 disaster triggered by a devastating quake and tsunami.

As local fishermen are worried about the negative impact from the water discharge, the Japanese government and Fukushima plant operator Tokyo Electric Power Company Holdings Inc. have not made a final decision on the treated

water, which is currently stored in tanks.

In his meeting with Yukiei Matsumoto, mayor of Naraha town near the Fukushima plant, Fuketa said, “It is scientifically clear that there will be no influence to marine products or to the environment” following the water release.

The nuclear regulator chief underlined the need for the government and Tepco to quickly make a decision, saying, “It will

take two or three years to prepare for the water release into the sea.”

At the Fukushima plant, toxic water is building up partly because groundwater is seeping into the reactor buildings to mix with water made radioactive in the process of cooling the damaged reactors.

Such contaminated water is treated to remove radioactive materials but tritium, a radioactive sub-

stance considered relatively harmless to humans, remains in the filtered water as it is difficult to separate even after passing through a treatment process.

At other nuclear power plants, tritium-containing water is routinely dumped into the sea after it is diluted. The regulator has been calling for the release of the water after diluting it to a density lower than standards set by law.

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China air force stages real combat training

BEIJING — Air Force of the People’s Liberation Army of China has carried out real combat training, with the involvement of the J-20 stealth fighter and the Y-20 military transport aircraft, according to a military statement.

The J-20, China’s fourth-generation medium and long-range fighter jet, made its maiden flight in 2011 and was officially commissioned into military service in September 2017.

Several new fighter

jets including the J-16, J-10C and H-6K bombers were also included in the training, the statement said.

The training is aimed at improving the air force’s capability to win battles, it said.—Xinhua ■

Japan reports 1st suspected bird flu case in livestock this winter

TAKAMATSU, (Japan) — Highly pathogenic avian influenza is suspected to have hit chickens at a poultry farm in western Japan's Kagawa Prefecture, according to the prefectural government, possibly making it the first bird flu case affecting livestock in Japan this season.

If the chickens test positive in ongoing genetic tests, the Kagawa prefectural government will call for the deployment of the Self-Defense Forces to cull around 51,000 chickens in the farm in the city of Sanuki.

The farm notified the prefectural government of a suspected bird flu case Wednesday morning, saying 55 chickens in one of its 15 poultry houses had died.

The facility has been raising about 51,000 chickens for meat in eight of the poultry houses. The other seven houses had no chick-

ens. In preliminary tests, three of 11 chickens tested positive and detailed genetic exams are being conducted.

If a pathogenic virus is confirmed, any move-

ment of poultry and eggs will be restricted in a radius of 3 kilometers from the infected site and farms within its 10-km radius will be banned from transporting birds and eggs out of

the area.

The farm has stopped shipping chickens elsewhere and the prefectural government has cleaned the area with disinfectants.—Kyodo News ■

Australia's Port Hedland clearing out ships as Cyclone Joyce intensifies

SYDNEY — Australia's Port Hedland iron ore terminal expects to clear all remaining vessels from its harbor by 1030 GMT as a safety measure after a tropical cyclone intensified off the nation's western coast on Thursday, Pilbara Ports Authority said.

The port's biggest user, global mining giant BHP, said it was monitoring the progress of Cyclone Joyce amid forecasts it will reach Category 3 strength by early Friday morning, packing wind gusts of 165-224 km per hour.

"All vessels are expected to be cleared from the port by 6.30 p.m (1030 GMT) tonight, at which time the port will be officially closed," the authority said. The port accounts for over half of Australia's

iron ore exports, handling more than a million tonnes a day from the Pilbara iron belt, the majority bound for Chinese steel mills.

The Bureau of Meteorology said earlier a tropical low had reached cyclone strength and would intensify overnight, affecting the Pilbara region on Friday or early Saturday.

The port is used by three of Australia's top four iron ore miners, BHP, Fortescue Metals Group and Gina Rinehart's Hancock Prospecting.

"The safety of our people is our highest priority and we are closely monitoring conditions relating to the cyclone," Fortescue Chief Executive Nev Power said in a statement emailed to Reuters.—Reuters ■

China supports DPRK, South Korea in promoting inter-Korean dialogue, exchanges — Xi

BEIJING — Chinese President Xi Jinping said Thursday that China has always supported the improvement of relations between South Korea and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), as well as their reconciliation and cooperation. In a telephone conversation with his South Korean counterpart Moon Jae-in, Xi said China supports the two sides in promoting inter-Korean dialogue and exchanges to gradually advance the settlement of the Korean Peninsula issue.

Currently, challenges and opportunities co-exist on the Korean Peninsula, Xi said, expressing the hope that the Pyeong-Chang Winter Olympics will not only bring about opportunities for inter-Korean dialogue, but also help improve the situation on the peninsula.

Xi said China is willing to enhance communication and cooperation with all sides concerned,

including South Korea, to pursue a positive outcome of the situation.

For his part, Moon said his country attaches great importance to China's important role in solving the dilemma on the Korean Peninsula, and appreciates China's support for inter-Korean dialogue and efforts to push for settlement through dialogue and safeguard peace and stability on the peninsula.

In their conversation, Xi recalled that Moon has paid a successful state visit to China not long ago, during which both sides reached important consensus on developing the China-South Korea strategic cooperative partnership and enhancing coordination on major regional and international issues.

Noting that the two countries have also strengthened mutual trust and cooperation during Moon's visit, Xi said China is pleased with the improvement of bilateral ties.—Xinhua ■

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
Fans shake, rattle and roll at Australia's Elvis festival

SYDNEY — Hundreds of hip-shaking and wig-wearing Elvis Presley lookalikes and fans of the late King of Rock and Roll took trains from Sydney bound for Australia's annual Elvis festival on Thursday.

Strains of "I Was The One" rang out along the platforms of Sydney's Central railway terminal as jumpsuited, coiffed and guitar-wielding passengers boarded the "Elvis Express" and "Blue Suede Express" bound for the country town of Parkes, some 357 km (222 miles) westward.

"Elvis is close to my heart because we grew up with Elvis in India," Alfred Vaz, who dressed in a blue flared jumpsuit and also goes by his stage name of Bollywood Elvis, or Raja, told Reuters television beside the locomotive.

"From a very little kid, we always used to gyrate and try singing Elvis like: One for the mon-

The festival, in its 26th year, is expected to attract about 25,000 people to Parkes, more than doubling its population for the duration of the four-day event.

The focus this year is on celebrating 50 years since Presley's 1968 "comeback special," an intimate and unplugged show credited with reviving his then-flagging recording career.

Street markets, lookalike contests, parades, a car show, displays of Presley artefacts and tribute performances are planned. "It's a must for all Elvis fans," said tribute artist Kingsley Rock, whose website promises: "If you want the King to sing at your thing, give me a ring."

"It's just one big party and everyone there loves Elvis, why wouldn't you not come back year after year," he told Reuters. — Reuters ■

Donatella Versace says won't be watching US TV series on brother's murder

MILAN — When a long-awaited US television series about the murder of Gianni Versace hits the small screen in a week's time, one key character will not be watching — the fashion designer's sister Donatella.

Now artistic director and vice-president of the Milan-based Versace fashion group, Donatella said in an interview published by Italian daily *la Repubblica* on Wednesday that the series and a book it draws on contain gossip and contradictions.

"I haven't seen (the series) nor will I see it, because after all this time it still hurts to see Gianni represented untruthfully," Donatella told the paper.

The nine-episode series "The Assassination of Gianni Versace: American Crime Story" stars Edgar Ramirez as Gianni, Spanish actress Penelope Cruz as his sister and Puerto Rican singer Ricky Martin as Gianni's boyfriend.

It was produced by 21st Century Fox and drew inspiration from Maureen Orth's 1999 book 'Vulgar Favours'. It will start broadcasting on 17 January.

In a statement sent by the company, the Versace family said "in the attempt to create

a sensational story, (the TV drama) presents gossip full of contradictions".

"It saddens (us) to see that among all possible portraits of (Gianni's) life and story, the producers chose to present the false and distorted version created by Maureen Orth," it added. The statement said Orth's book was full of speculation, adding the author had never sought information directly from the family and did not have the knowledge to tell the

story, including suppositions on Gianni's medical conditions.

Donatella also said in the interview that among the mistakes in the book was the assertion that Gianni had been weak at the time of his murder because he had AIDS. The family distanced itself from the series on Monday, saying it had not authorised it and was not involved. On Tuesday the producer defended the show, saying the family has been treated with respect in it.—Reuters ■

Spiders and fleas pack Albert Hall as Cirque du Soleil's Ovo hits London

LONDON — London's Royal Albert Hall was crawling with spiders, crickets, ants and fleas on Wednesday as Cirque du Soleil brought its insect-themed show Ovo to the famous venue for the first time.

'Ovo', which means egg in Portuguese, is about a day in the life of a community of 17 insects - portrayed by humans, not by insects - and how they cope with the arrival of a mysterious egg and the foreigner inside.

The show features eye-catching aerial displays to vibrant South American mu-

sical rhythms and is the 25th live production from Cirque du Soleil, the one-time Canadian street performer troupe that grew into a global circus and entertainment colossus.

Artistic director Tim Bennett said the show, which has been seen by over 5 million people since its premiere in Montreal eight years ago also carried an important message about social inclusion. "It's an insular colony of insects into which walks a foreigner, and he's initially rejected because he's different," Bennett told Reuters.—Reuters ■

Jennifer Lopez to guest star on 'Will and Grace'

LOS ANGELES — Singer-actor Jennifer Lopez has been roped in to feature as a guest star on the popular sitcom "Will and Grace". The 48-year-old artiste will appear in one episode of the revived comedy show as both herself and her "Shades of Blue" character detective Harlee San-

tos, *Variety* reported.

The airing date of the episode is yet to be announced.

The show, which had its original run from 1998-2006, was rebooted last year.

The ABC's revival series has been renewed for a 13-episode second season.—PTI ■

Serena absence gives chance for a new superstar to emerge

SINGAPORE — Women's tennis starts its 2018 campaign with the usual early focus on the Australian Open and a huge question mark over who can fill the yawning gap left by the absence of Serena Williams.

No one was able to get anywhere close last year, not just in terms of consistently winning the biggest tournaments but also when it comes to charisma.

Williams left Melbourne a year ago with a 23rd grand slam title under her belt but soon hung up her racket for the remainder of 2017 upon discovering she was

eight weeks pregnant at the time of her triumph.

Her forced hiatus will extend past this year's tournament after she decided last week that she was not fully match-ready, giving the chasing pack more opportunities to stamp their authority on the women's game.



Boris Becker, who knows a bit about both winning grand slams and star appeal, believes the landscape at the top of the women's game is just too confused at the moment.

"I think there is a real opportunity for the next superstar. It's not clear cut," he told Reuters. " (Simona) Halep is number one at the moment but we have four

Australian Open, that's good and that's bad. I think the sport needs a strong rivalry because that's good for fans. But the women's game doesn't have that at the moment." The remaining 2017 majors were shared by three rising stars of the game, with Latvian teen Jelena Ostapenko storming to the French Open title, Garbine Muguruza
