Chairman says MIC will be 'transparent', take 'proactive approach', and promote 'responsible investment'

MIC Chairman meets four foreign chambers of commerce

CHAIRMAN of the Myanmar Investment Commission Union Minister U Thaung Tun said that the MIC, under new management, will be "transparent", take "proactive approach" and promote "responsible investment".

Speaking at a meeting organised by the American Chamber of Commerce, the Australian Chamber of Commerce, and the European Chamber of Commerce at the Melia Hotel in Yangon yesterday, the MIC Chairman stressed that, with the launching of a number of significant steps, Myanmar is now open for business. He pledged that MIC will be "more efficient and investor-friendly".

He underscored investment opportunities in Myanmar and urged foreign Chambers of Commerce to take advantage of the changes and invest in the country. "Now is the perfect time to bring your

investment to Myanmar", he said. The representatives of the foreign chambers also shared their perspectives as well as challenges that would need to be addressed. They also confirmed their desire to support Myanmar's economic development and promote partnership with Myanmar.—Myanmar News Agency ■

YBS Airport Shuttle commences in Yangon

The YBS airport shuttle bus line that will stop at 13 bus stops between Yangon International Airport and Yangon Central Railway Station began operations yesterday morning.

The bus line commenced after negotiations were completed between the Omini Focus Company and the Yangon Region Transport Authority at the beginning of May.

"Today the route from the Airport to Sule was available to the public after the results of the test runs were made public yesterday. In addition, today people can use the shuttle service for free; however the designated fare is 500 kyats. Now there are 35 buses that are operating and later up to 50 buses will be traveling this route" said driver U Aung Ko Ko.

"The bus line will also be handy for airport staff and personnel as an alternative option for commuting to and from work. Passengers getting on the bus between the two terminus points will have to wait at the bus stop that is most convenient for them. SEE PAGE-3

Officials provide boats, food, cash during Mon State flood

Heavy rains poured down in Mawlamyine without interruption starting from the evening of 16 June until the morning of 17 June, causing water flowing into the wards to rapidlt rise to five-and-a-half feet or six feet. Residents had to be moved to higher ground and given shelter:

The following are interviews with relevant authorities about relief, aid and recovery.

Union Minister Dr. Win Myat Aye

Heavy rain fell all over Mon State, not only in Mawlamyine. It happened in the five townships of Mawlamayine, Mudon, Thanbyuzayat, Ye and Paung. As water suddenly flowed into the wards, up to 42 relief camps had to be opened. The camps are holding 8,263 persons from the five townships. When I learnt of the overnight rains first thing in the morning, I went there immediately.

Normally, flooding and inundation doesn't happen much in Mon State. Of course it does happen, but it was never up to this level before. As climate change is affecting Myanmar and the world, there heavy rains, floods and inundation have occured, but this is happening in many places so it can be said that there isn't a place in the world where there can't be any natural disasters. That is why we are concerned and worried about this.

Are we prepared and ready? We were worried. That is why we contacted (Mon State) before dawn. Hluttaw representatives also contacted us. As the Hluttaw was in session, Hluttaw representatives were also in Nay Pyi Taw and they contacted us. We decided to go there immediately. The downpour had slackened, but the water rose up to five or six feet and people were in camps, so we went straight to the camps. As the rain slackened, the water level started to drop, but the time coincided with high tide, so the tide pushed back the water, making the water level remain high. If the rain was not a continuous downpour, it wouldn't be this bad, but the heavy and long downpour caused the water level to rise to five or six feet.

From past incidents, we learnt that when there is flooding and inundation, people need

to be evacuated from their homes to safe places and this requires boats. So we deployed boats to Bilin and Kyaikto area, where most of the flooding and inundation occured. But when there was flooding and inundation in Mawlamyine, we knew that we wouldn't have enough boats. As soon as I knew of the heavy rains, I arranged to send three boats from Yangon. Because of this, the boats were in Mawlamyine just after we were there. That was timely.

Another thing is feeding the people in the camp. We can't gave them money or even rice and food as they wouldn't be able to buy or cook the food. But civil society organisations were strong in Mawlamyine. There were many donors in the wards too. Donors and civil society organisations (CSOs) teamed up and prepared food for the people. As the water subsided, some in the camps returned to their homes. When we were in camps on the morning of 17 June, some had already left for their homes. When we went back to the camps again on 18 June, more had left. Donors and CSOs were cooking food for the remaining people as well as providing cash assistance.

For those who returned to their homes, we provided one week's ration of rice. This is at the assistance rate set by our

ministry. The rate was Ks2,100 per person, and we multiplied this by the number of affected people, coming up with over Ks15.5 million. We handed over this amount immediately to the state government.

Our social welfare, relief and resettlement personnel also helped, but their number is only a few. We need a lot. But we appreciate the fact that CSOs pitched in and helped. Lessons are learnt on having stronger connections with them. In the past we coordinated and worked with them, but the connection and contact was not strong.

For those who returned to their homes, we provided one week's ration of rice.

We need to strengthen this. By the evening of 18 June, most of the camps were closed. Only about two remain. Why were most camps closed? It is because the water receded. But the water wouldn't have receded if the rain continued. If the rain continued, the area would have remained flooded and inundated. Why is this? This is happening all over

the country. First, the rain wasn't this heavy. But more than that, the drains were blocked. In some places, due to cost cutting in construction, some home don't have drains.

I explained this when I met with the Chief Minister and the public. Let us do things properly and systematically. Drains should remain as drains and do their functions. Trash shouldn't be thrown indiscriminately, blocking the drains. All need to participate in this and do it properly. This is one part.

Another part is about the pagoda. The platform is most important here. The platform was extended in 2013-2014. Landslides occured where the platform was extended. Why was there landslide? Because when we look down the platform, we saw a lot of trash underneath. The trash includes plastics that loosened the earth's compactness. The ground became weak and unstable. When there is heavy rain, the ground sinks and slides away. Another thing is construction of religious structures. When the structures were constructed, the strength of the ground was weakened (with the structure's weight bearing down more heavily while the land is weakened with trash). We learnt a lot from what had happened in Mawlamyine. The government, the people and

CSOs need to work together so that this sort of thing does not happen again.

The water rose rapidly. But once the rain stopped, we conducted clearing up works, which resulted in the water subsiding quickly. Once the water subsided, people returned to their homes and start restoring it to a normal situation. Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement himself went and provided assistance on behalf of the ministry. Experts and technicians from Ministry of Construction assessed the situation and were providing necessary supports and expertise for the landslide at Kyaikthanlan Pagoda. They were there speedily as per the instructions and guidelines of National Disaster Management Committee (NDMC) Chairman Vice President U Henry Van Thio. Ks100 million had been donated to Mon State Chief Minister as initial donation to conduct repair works. This was also according to the instructions and guidelines of the NDMC Chairman.

U Myint Zaw, Deputy Director General, Department of Buildings, Ministry of Construction

The Minister for Construction instructed us to inspect the landslide at Kyaikthanlan Pagoda and our team from Nay Pyi Taw reached Mawlamyine at noon on 18 June and assessed the damages. There were many cracks on the pagoda platform. The pagoda trustee immediately poured cement into the cracks and the platform was covered with plastic sheets so that water could no longer seep underneath. It will take time to make a complete repair. A retaining wall will have to be constructed. Drains need to be constructed so that water flow is good. Not only the Ministry of Construction, but NGOs like Myanmar Engineering Council, Myanmar Engineering Society, Myanmar earthquake committee and geologists will be invited to do the works properly.

The state government had also formed a state level committee for this and the Union Minister had also informed the President Office about this. At the Union-level committee, Deputy Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lin is the chairman and I'm the secretary.

336 gem lots to be sold through open tender

A total of 336 gem lots with a basic price of 500 euros and above for each lot will be sold through an open tender system on the fourth day of the Myanma Gems Emporium.

At the emporium, 336 gem lots and 6,795 jade lots were displayed. The gem lots have a basic price of 500 euros per lot. Finished jade lots have a basic price of 1,000 euros and raw jade lots have a basic price of 4,000 euros. There are 14 jade lots with a basic price of one million euros and above, and there is one jade lot with a basic price of 15 million euros.

On the third day of the 55th Myanma Gems Emporium, gem merchants inspected the gem lots with a basic price of 500 euros per lot displayed on the upper floor of the Mani Yadana Jade Hall in the morning and submitted their tenders into the tender boxes. Similarly, gem merchants inspected the raw jade lots with a basic price of 4,000 euros and above and finished jade lots with a basic price of 1,000 euros and

above displayed on the upper floor of Mani Yadana Jade Hall. Officials responsible provided the necessary assistance.

Raw jade lots with a basic price of 4,000 euros and above and finished jade lots with a basic price of 1,000 euros and above will be sold under an open tender system from 24 to 29 June. On 24 June, jade lot numbers 1 to 1,150; on 25 June, jade lot numbers 1,151 to 2,300; on 26 June, jade lot numbers 2,301 to 3,450; on 27 June, jade lot numbers 3,451 to 4,600; on 28 June, jade lot numbers 4,601 to 5,750 and on 29 June, jade lot numbers 5,751 to 6,795 will be sold.

The 55th Myanma Gems Emporium organised by the Myanma Gem Emporium Central Committee will be held until 29 June at Mani Yadana Jade Hall, Nay Pvi Taw.

Gem merchants from China. Thailand, Canada, Australia and the United States visited the emporium, with most of them being from China. Over 1,200 local gem merchants and over 3,000 foreign gem merchants are attending the emporium.

At least six dead in landslide in Phakant Township

Six people in Phakant Town- Affairs Committee and in Mawship were killed Friday in landslides after heavy rains inundated the ground and caused a creek to overflow its banks.

YBS 32 to operate new route between **Maritime University and Htaukkyant**

LUDUMAIKSWE Public Bus Line said its YBS 32 will operate a new route between Myanmar Maritime University in Thanlyin Township and Htaukkyant in Mingaladon Township for the convenience of commuters.

YBS 32 will begin operations on the new route from 26 June, with a fleet of 50 new buses. It will operate on the following route: Myanmar Maritime University-Myoma Market-Thakayta roundabout-Kyauktaing-Thuwunna junction-Zawana junction-Nandawon market-Pinya-436-North Okkalapa roundabout-Chaukgway-Aungmingala highway bus terminal-Palemyothit-Nwekhway-Htaukkyant.

The company has arranged for 25 buses to depart from the maritime university and an additional 25 buses to depart from the Htaukkyant side on a daily basis.

The first bus will leave each gate at 5 a.m. and the last bus for the day at 8 p.m.

The bus fare has been set at Ks200 and Ks300 depending on the distance covered by the passenger. Monks, nuns, pregnant women, primary and middle school students and people with disabilities are entitled to travel for free on YBS 32 route.

The opening ceremony of the new YBS 32 route will take place at the Myanmar Maritime University on 26 June.-Kyaw Hsan Myint (IPRD)■

Shopping mall in Hpa-an expected to create more job opportunities

PLANS are underway to construct a new shopping mall in Hpa-an, the capital city in Kayin State, which is expected to create more employment opportunities for residents, said U Than Naing, Kayin State Minister for Planning, Finance and Development Affairs.

In his speech at the tender opening ceremony on Thursday, U Than Naing said

the new shopping mall will be built on the former highway bus terminal site and will be the first-of-its-kind in Kayin State. Thanks to the new mall, the state will generate more revenue than ever before. Among 10 competitors, UHM Co. won the tender for the project.

U Tun Aung Shwe, manager of the company which won the tender, said the company's proposal was designed to allow local sellers to run their retail businesses on the ground floor. Shopping centres, cinemas, a playground and a car park will also be included in the mall project. The proposal also focuses on the sale of Kayin traditional foods and other delicacies.

India-Myanmar border trade exceeds \$30 mln this FY

DURING the current 2018-2019 fiscal year, bilateral border trade between Myanmar and India totalled US\$31.086 million, an increase by \$15.8 million against the same period last year, the commerce ministry reported on Friday.

Myanmar's exports to India from cross-borders between 1 April and mid-June this year were larger than its imports.

The country exported a wide variety of domestic products amounting to \$27.23 million and imported commodities worth only \$3.857 million. The two countries are carrying out border trade primarily through the Tamu and Reed cross-border trade camps. A major part of bilateral imports and exports are delivered through marine routes.

Myanmar usually imports medicines, oil cakes, electronic products, motorbikes, cotton yarn, non-alloy steel and other construction materials.

Local products consisting of areca nuts, ginger, saffron, turmeric, bay leaves and other fruits and vegetables, fishery and forest products, as well as human hair are normally exported to neighbouring India.

Myanmar mainly conducts border trade with four countries—China, India, Thailand and Bangladesh—through 16 land border gates. Over the first 76 days of this FY, the total border trade hit \$1.607 billion, including \$1.031 billion in exports and \$576.572 million in imports. In the current FY, Myanmar saw investments worth \$1.352 million from India. India's investment in Myanmar in the 2017-2018 FY was \$10.993 million through three investment projects, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).— Khine Khant ■

Agro exports continue to decline in current FY

The export of agricultural products in the present 2018-2019 fiscal year decreased to US\$614.128 million, compared to the same period in the 2017-2018 FY, when Myanmar fetched \$743.787 million according to the latest report of the commerce ministry.

Between 1 April and 15 June, the country saw no exports of agro products from the public sector. Only private companies were able to export the same products to overseas countries, the value of which decreased by nearly \$130 million against last year.

As an agriculture commodity-producing country, Myanmar annually exports a wide variety of agro products, including rice, beans and pulses, garlic and other kitchen crops, melons, mangoes, avocados, cucumbers and other marketable fruits, fibers, rubber and other raw materials.

During the same period, the country exported animal products worth \$54.785 million, marine products worth \$134.426 million, forest products worth \$141.199 million and mineral products worth more than \$281.407 million.

The value of exports of manufactured goods was estimated at \$1.694 billion and that of miscellaneous items at \$304 million.

The government is making continuous efforts to boost the country's agro exports, striving to help farmers solve farming-related problems, such as high costs of input and production.—Shwe Khine

Taxi driver sentenced to death for rape and murder of FDA staff

A taxi driver convicted of raping and murdering a staff of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) of the Ministry of Health was given death sentence yesterday.

Myo Zaw Oo, also know as Sedona, was arrested and charged under the Myanmar Penal Code for the rape and murder of Ma Shwe Yee Win, 26, a deputy supervisor of the FDA, in January. He was arrested three days after her body was found. "The culprit was found guilty of the rape and murder of Ma Shwe Yee Win and the court handed down the death sentence according to the law," U Tun Tun Oo, the spokesperson of Yangon Eastern District court, told journalists after the court session.-GNLM

Haul of drug seized in Mohnyin Township

Heroin worth K 240 million was seized along with stimulant tablets and one percussion lock firearm in a farmhouse at the foot of Mt Hsinkhaung near Nantmon Village, Mohnyin Township, Kachin State on the morning of 22 June.

Police officers led by Police Inspector Aung San Win of Kachin State Anti-Crime Squad together with their counterparts from Lonton Police Station, acting on information, searched the farmhouse of U Pwa Maung aged 56, of Nantmon Village at the foot of Mt. Hsinkhaung and found 165 soap cases each containing 11 grams of heroin weighing 1815 grams, 200 blue packets each containing 190 stimulant tablets and one percussion lock firearm along with his wife Daw Khin Htay aged 55 who was at the hut.

Upon interrogation, it is known that the drugs were possessed by Daw Cho Cho Win, daughter of U Pwa Maung and Daw Khin Htay, who was on the run.

The seized drugs are believed to be worth of K 240 million. Action is being taken against the three according to the law by Lonton Police Station.—Win Naing (Kachin Myay)

Encourage production of finished jade, gem products in order to crack foreign markets

VER 4,000 local and international gem merchants gathered at the 55th Myanma Gems Emporium, which kicked off three days ago.

The sales under the open tender system attracted local gem merchants, especially buyers and sellers, under one roof. Over 500 companies and licensed traders exhibited jade lots and pearls produced by pearl farms in Taninthayi Region at the emporium.

The emporium brought benefits to over 1,200 local traders and over 3,000 foreign traders to inspect about 6,000 jade and gem lots in one venue.

This kind of event is held in Myanmar at the time when the mining season closes. The event has attracted an increasing number of traders year on year.

There is still no strong local market for finished jade and gem products. We need modern technology to produce marketable products to enter foreign markets. Another benefit of the sales is that full tax set over the sales directly goes into the state coffer and the seller received the remaining sales amount at one point.

In normal sales outside, there are limitations to declaring the sale price and paying tax.

Myanmar's pearls produced from pearl farms in Taninthayi Region have found a strong market in Hong Kong, and annual pearl sales have been held six times.

But emporiums in Myanmar only display upgraded raw gems and jade stones because of the lack of technological knowhow, which is needed to finish gem products in the country.

There is still no strong local market for finished jade and gem products. We need modern technology to produce marketable products to enter foreign

markets.

To produce marketable finished products, we need to cooperate with those who have the technology and can find foreign markets. Effective support is the sine qua non for the development of the finished products.

Myanmar, which has over 1,200 registered local gem merchants, both buyers and sellers, needs more emporiums in order to fulfill the technological requirements of manufacturing finished gem products because there are plenty of raw jade and jewelry products available, according to the Myanmar Gems and Jewellery Entrepreneurs Association.

Compulsory deposits paid to reserve jade lots and gemstones at gems emporium in Nay Pyi Taw has doubled to 10 per cent from 5 per cent previously, in attempts to prevent cancellations for purchases by buyers and to help sellers seal a deal following the rules and regulations in order to support the local merchants and to avoid broken deals.

The efforts for producing finished products at home would create job opportunities and business opportunities for our people. Only when we get a strong market for our finished products, can we also reduce illegal trading of the precious stones and gems.

New York puts its rats on ice

NEW YORK — A snout and two little black eyes pop out from the hole, too late: A foot already covers them and the hole will be quickly filled with dry ice.

This new weapon in the hands of the New York City Health Department pest control team spells certain death for the rat.

Rick Simeone's team is at work in Sara D. Roosevelt Park on the Lower East Side, one of Manhattan's oldest districts.

The day before, they spent more than three hours locating all the entrances to the burrows, 67 in all. That means there could be more than 250 "rattus norvegicus," the scientific name for common brown rats, living there.

Burrow by burrow, the team drops into each hole several small pellets resembling ice cubes but which are actually dry ice, carbon dioxide in solid form.

The surrounding air temperature ensures that the carbon dioxide reverts to gaseous form and asphyxiates the rats, which are usually asleep at this time of the day.

Normally, 90 to 100 per cent of the rodents are exterminated.

"It's a method that's very effective in mostly green spaces, parks," says Simeone, director of pest control for the New York City Health Department.

"You always hear that rats are winning the battle. But this turns it around."

Rats have made their home

in New York since the middle of the 18th Century and are responsible for the transmission of numerous diseases.

A 2014 study published by a PhD candidate at Columbia University estimated about two million rats in the US financial capital, which has a human population of more than 8.5 million.

The rats are most often seen scurrying in the street or in the subway. A celebrated video posted on YouTube in 2015 showed a rat dragging a slice of pizza on the subway stairs.

They live an average of only six or seven months in the port city, but a female can give birth to as many as 100 baby rats each year.

Shutting the pantry door

In 2012, John Stellberger became the first to use dry ice against rats in the United States, based on an idea from one of his employees.

The head of EHS Pest Control company, Stellberger recalls that he spoke of the idea with sanitation officials in Boston, who conducted a brief trial in 2016.

That pilot was suspended after several months pending an approval by the US Environmental Protection Agency,

which came in June 2017.

At the beginning of this year after several months of tests, New York officially adopted the dry ice technique, joining Boston, Chicago and Washington.

Dry ice is only used in open spaces including parks and green areas, Simeone explained, because it would be too complicated to identify rat tunnels in the streets or residential areas where concrete is everywhere.

Aside from its effectiveness, dry ice presents no risk to wildlife in parks and public gardens, unlike rodenticide which had previously been the only weapon deployed against rats.—AFP ■

South Korea, DPRK agree to hold reunion of separated families from 20 August to 26 August

SEOUL – South Korea and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) on Friday agreed to hold the reunion of Korean families separated across the inter-Korean border in the 20-26 August period at the DPRK's scenic resort of Mount Kumgang.

The agreement came after delegations from the two sides held Red-Cross talks at a hotel in Mount Kumgang to discuss humanitarian issues. –Xinhua

Four of family die as car rams into stationary truck in South India

NEW DELHI-Four members of a family have been killed after their car rammed into a parked truck in southern Indian state of Telangana Friday, police said.

The accident occurred on a busy highway near Katnapally in the state's Peddapalle district, some 180 km from capital Hyderabad.

"The car hit the stationary truck from behind at high speed this morning. A couple and their two children died on the spot," a police official said.

The family was returning to Peddapalle town from Hyderabad when the accident happened, the official said.—Xinhua

Man detained at London underground station after claiming to have bomb

LONDON-A man claiming to have a bomb at London's Charing Cross underground station has been arrested, the British Transport Police (BTP) said Friday morning.

Police officers were called to the tube station this morning. Both the underground and mainline stations were evacuated as a precaution and a cordon was put in place while officers dealt with the incident, the BTP said. A 38-year-old man was detained by officers and has been taken to a place of safety.-Xinhua

France eases rules on wine stocks to mitigate weather risks

PARIS — French vineyards will be allowed under new rules to hold back more of their production each year to protect them in case harvests are damaged by extreme weather including storms and drought.

The move comes after a series of fierce hailstorms battered fields across France in May, the latest in a series of weather-related losses that many growers attribute to climate change.

The National Institute of Origin and Quality (INAO), which sets the rules governing

France's prestigious wine appellations, said Thursday that producers of red and white wines would now be able to stock 20 per cent of their annual output, for a total of 50 per cent over a three-year period.

Previously they were allowed to keep just 10 per cent of their stock.

"This decision will reinforce the resilience of vineyards against recurrent weather hazards, by playing a role similar to crop insurance," the INAO and the top government official for the Gironde department,

which includes Bordeaux, said Thursday.

The storage rules were originally rolled out across France starting in 2013 to ensure vineyards would have reserves in case quality or quantify suffered for a particular vintage. Dessert wines and champagne were not included in the programme.

But the INAO said the new rules would now be tested for producers of three sweet wine appellations: Sauternes, Barsac and Monbazillac — the latter a popular pairing with foie gras.

An increase in early frosts

and summer droughts have taken a toll on winegrowers as well as food producers in France and elsewhere in Europe in recent years, often causing price spikes for consumers.

Europe's wine production dropped to levels unseen since World War II last year as extreme weather battered top producers Italy, France, Spain and Germany, the main farmers' union said last October.

A spring cold snap in the Bordeaux region last year, for example, slashed the 2017 harvest by 40 per cent.—AFP ■

Saudi Arabia gears up to end women driving ban

JEDDAH (SAUDI ARABIA) Saudi Arabia will allow women to drive from Sunday, ending the world's only ban on female motorists, a historic reform marred by what rights groups call an expanding crackdown on activists.

Overturning the decades-long ban, a glaring symbol of repression against women, is part of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's much-trumpeted reform drive to modernise the conservative petrostate.

Potentially thousands of female drivers are set to take the wheel on Sunday, a long-awaited rite of passage for women in the kingdom that many say could usher in a new era of social mobility.

"It is a very important step and essential for women's free mobility," Hana al-Khamri, author of the forthcoming book "Female Journalists in Gender Apartheid Saudi Arabia", told AFP.

"Women in Saudi Arabia live under patriarchal structures. Allowing them to sit behind the wheel will help challenge social and gender norms that hinder mobility, autonomy and independence."

For many women the move should prove transformative, freeing them from their dependence on private chauffeurs or male relatives and resulting in big family savings.

"It's a relief," Najah al-Otaibi, a senior analyst at pro-Saudi think-tank Arabia Foundation, told AFP.

The kingdom earlier this month began issuing its first driving licences to women in decades, with some swapping their foreign permits for Saudi ones after undergoing a practical test.

Some three million women in Saudi Arabia could receive licences and actively begin driving by 2020, according to consultancy firm PricewaterhouseCoopers.

A handful of female driving schools have cropped up in cities like Riyadh and Jeddah, training women to drive cars and also Harley Davidson motorbikes scenes that were unimaginable

Many Saudi women have ebulliently declared plans on social media to drive their mothers for coffee or ice cream as soon as the ban ends on Sunday, a mundane experience elsewhere in the world but a dazzling novelty in the desert kingdom.

For decades, hardliners cited austere Islamic interpretations to justify the driving ban, with some asserting that women lack the intelligence to drive and that lifting the prohibition would promote promiscuity.

The decision to lift the ban was catalysed in large measure by what experts characterise as economic pain in the kingdom owing to a protracted oil slump.

The move is expected to boost women's employment, and according to a Bloomberg estimate, add \$90 billion to economic output by 2030.

Many women fear they are still easy prey for conservatives in a nation where male "guardians" — their fathers, husbands or other relatives — can exercise arbitrary authority to make decisions on their behalf.

The government has preemptively addressed concerns of abuse by outlawing sexual harassment, with a prison term of up to five years and a maximum penalty of 300,000 riyals (\$80,000).

'Not a criminal or traitor'

Prince Mohammed, appointed heir to the most powerful throne in the Middle East a year ago this month, has also lifted a ban on cinemas and mixed-gender concerts, following his public vow to return the kingdom to moderate Islam.

But much of the initial optimism over his reforms appears to have been dented by a sweeping crackdown on women activists who long opposed the driving ban.

Authorities have said that nine of 17 arrested people remain in prison, accused of undermining the kingdom's security and aiding enemies of the state.

The detainees include three generations of activists, among them 28-year-old Loujain al-Hathloul, also held in 2014 for more than 70 days for attempting to drive from neighbouring United Arab Emirates to Saudi Arabia, and Aziza al-Yousef, a retired professor at Riyadh's King Saud University.

State-backed newspapers have published front-page pictures of some of the activists, the word "traitor" stamped across them in red.

Human Rights Watch this week said the kingdom has arrested two more women activists - Nouf Abdelaziz and Mayaa al-Zahrani, in what it denounced as an "unrelenting crackdown".

"I am not a provoker, not a vandaliser, not a terrorist, a criminal or a traitor," Abdelaziz said in a letter before her arrest, which was cited by HRW.

"I have never been (anything) but a good citizen who loves her country and wishes for it nothing but the best."

Both women are being held incommunicado, HRW said.

Saudi authorities did not respond to requests for comment.

Even some of the prince's ardent supporters have labelled the crackdown a "mistake".

It has been seen as a calculated move both to placate clerics incensed by his modernisation drive and also to send a clear signal to activists that he alone is the arbiter of change.

But many Saudi women nevertheless credit decades of fearless activism for the end of the driving ban. "These activists should be credited for this historical change, not jailed," Khamri, who is currently based in Sweden, said. "It is sad that these women who have been fighting for the right to drive won't be there to witness this historic moment." —AFP

Greece 'turning a page' as eurozone declares crisis over

ATHENS - The Greek government on Friday said the country was "turning a page" after eurozone ministers declared its crisis over as they granted Athens debt relief under a bailout exit strategy.

The eurozone ministers' agreement comes nearly a decade after Athens stunned the world with out-of-control spending, sparking three bailouts and a near collapse of the euro single currency.

"Greece is turning a page, its debt is now viable," government spokesman Dimitris Tzanakopoulos said. "I think the Greek people can smile, they can breathe again."

"This is a historic decision,"

Tzanakopoulos told state TV ERT

Following the eurozone ministers' hard-fought agreement declared earlier Friday, Greece is slated to leave its third financial rescue since 2010 on August 20.

"The Greek crisis ends here tonight," said EU Economic Affairs Commissioner Pierre Moscovici, after marathon talks in Luxembourg.

The deal was expected to be an easy one, but last-minute resistance by Germany -- 's long bailout nemesis and biggest creditor -- dragged the talks on for six hours.

The ministers agreed to extend maturities by 10 years on major parts of its total debt obligations, a mountain that has reached 180 per cent of the economy -- almost double the country's annual economic output.

- No illusions -

They also agreed to disburse 15 billion euros (\$17.5 billion) to ease Greece's exit from its rescue programme.

This would leave Greece with a hefty 24 billion euro safety cushion, officials said.

"The Greek government is happy with the agreement," Greek Finance Minister Euclid Tsakalotos said after the talks.

But "to make this worthwhile we have to make sure that the Greek people must quickly see concrete results... they need to feel the change in their own pockets," he added.

Optimism is tempered by Greece's remaining fiscal obligations, which will demand serious discipline, observers say.

"This is a very tight programme.

A surplus of 3.5 per cent to 2022 and 2.2 per cent (on average) to 2060 is not easy at all," Kostas Boukas, asset management director at Beta Securities, told Athens 9.84 radio.

"We'll have to see if the pledges will be kept, especially as they depend on international developments as well," he said.

Under pressure from its creditors Greece has already agreed to slash pensions again in 2019, and reduce the tax-free income threshold for millions of people in 2020.

Further cuts will be made to maintain the 3.5-per cent surplus, if necessary.

"It would be a terrible mistake to cultivate illusions that the end of the bailout means a return to normality," said pro-opposition daily Ta Nea.

"What follows is tough oversight which no other country has experienced in a post-bailout period," the daily said.

The European Commission has already specified that Greece will remain under fiscal supervision until it repays 75 per cent of its loans. —AFP ■

'I really don't care': Melania Trump jacket stuns on migrant visit

WASHINGTON — Melania Trump surprised the world by visiting child migrants on the US-Mexico border Thursday — but it was her choice of clothing for the trip that stunned the internet: a jacket emblazoned with the words "I really don't care, do you?"

A tone-deaf sartorial decision -- or a hidden message from the first lady? And if so, to whom?

The images of Melania Trump sporting the olive green khaki jacket as she boarded a flight to Texas -- which immediately went viral -- surfaced as the White House struggles to calm international anger over the practice of splitting migrant children from their parents.

Asked about the military-style jacket with large white brush-style lettering - apparently sold for \$39 at

Zara, according to the Daily Mail which first spotted the odd choice of outfit - the first lady's spokeswoman Stephanie Grisham said "there was no hidden message."

"It's a jacket," Grisham said. "After today's important visit to Texas, I hope the media isn't going to choose to focus on her wardrobe."

"#SheCares #Its-

JustAJacket" Grisham tweeted later on, as speculation swirled online.

But the president's take on the jacket told a decidedly different story: "IREALLY DON'T CARE,

DOU?' written on the back of Melania's jacket, refers to the Fake News Media," Donald Trump tweeted shortly after his wife's return

"Melania has learned how dishonest they are, and she truly no longer cares!"

When she arrived in McAllen, Texas the first lady had changed out of the controversial garment into a cream button-up safari-style jacket.

But upon returning to the White House she sported the jacket once more, despite stifling heat and humidity in the Washington region.

Melania Trump's unannounced trip to a youth shelter for migrants and a Border Patrol processing center came one day after President Donald Trump made a sudden decision to end the practice of splitting immigrant families that has left more than 2,300 minors separated from their parents or guardians.

Images and recordings of distressed children held in enclosures akin to cages have sparked global fury.

The first lady herself called for political compromise to end the stripping of children from their parents — the result of the Trump administration's "zero tolerance" policy against illegal border crossings, in effect since May.

It was not the first time Melania Trump raised eyebrows for her fashion choices when out in the field: last year she wore needle-thin high stiletto heels to observe the devastation wrought by Hurricane Harvey.—AFP

East Timor's new prime minister sworn in

JAKARTA — East Timor President Francisco Guterres on Friday swore in former guerrilla commander Jose Maria de Vasconcelos, who previously was president from 2012-2017, as the country's new prime minister.

Congratulating Vasconcelos, Guterres stressed that the new prime

minister's swearing-in "is proof of the robust functioning of our institutions and our democracy (and) we therefore have every reason to be pleased."

He called for a "constructive relationship" between the government and the opposition "because the success of the national development does not only

depend on the government, but also on the constructive participation of the opposition, state institutions and people in general." The new Cabinet will be announced in the near future after it is formed. Vasconcelos has already submitted a proposed Cabinet to Guterres, but the latter rejected some members who have been

suspected of or are undergoing legal proceedings relating to corruption.

Vasconcelos was the only candidate nominated for the prime ministership. His candidacy was proposed by the Alliance for Change and Progress, or AMP, a coalition of independence hero Xanana Gusmao's center-left National Congress for Timorese Reconstruction, or CNRT, and two smaller parties. The AMP won the general election in May, the country's second in less than a year, and secured 34 seats, or enough to control the 65-seat unicameral parliament.

Its main rival, Fretilin,

won the July 2017 election

by a narrow margin, forcing it to join with the smaller Democratic Party to form a government. With only 30 seats in the parliament, however, the minority government twice failed to pass a budget, prompting the president to dissolve parliament in January and call a new election.-Kyodo News

Environment the loser in Gabon capital's rush for growth

LIBREVILLE — "It's an environmental disaster," said Magloir-Desire Mounganga as he strode across the soggy, spongy soil where mangroves have been ripped up for development near the Gabonese capital Libreville, threatening its fragile ecosystem.

"Here the mangrove trees have been completely razed, you can even see the marks left by the bulldozer," said Mounganga, an expert from Gabon's National Agency for National Parks. The path in the district of Angondje Nton leads to a section of large homes owned by the wealthy. The svelte buildings rise on muddy terrain where mangroves once flourished. Bit by bit, the tough, bushy little trees are being ripped away as Libreville pursues its relentless and almost unbridled expansion.

But, say experts, their destruction is de-

priving the coastal city of a vital ecological reserve and weakening its shield against disasters such as storm surges.

"Mangroves have the capacity to retain water and to combat coastal erosion with their (extensive) root systems, which also act as nurseries for marine species," said Medard Obiang Ebanega, a geographer at Libreville's **Omar Bongo University**.

And by clearing away the mangroves and building their homes here. Gabon's rich are creating problems for themselves,

said Mounganga.

'Not fit to be built on' "The ground here is peaty. There's always water in it," he said, boots sinking into the boggy soil. "Peat can prevent flooding, it's like a sponge — but when you cover

it with concrete, the water will rise ... With global warming, these houses will inevitably be flooded," he said, referring to the danger of rising seas, driven higher by thermal expansion.

"This land is not fit to be built on. That's what people don't understand."

Gabon, an oil-rich, small equatorial African country of about 270,000 square kilometres (104,000 square miles), has won plaudits for some of its ecological work. The country has 13 national parks constituting 11 per cent of its land area, as well as 20 protected marine zones a strong achievement by the standards of central Africa. Its territory accounts for around half of all the mangroves in the extensive Gulf of Guinea region, most of which are on the outskirts of Libreville and, in theory, are shielded from urban spread.

"This is the only capital in the whole Atlantic basin to be almost entirely surrounded by protected areas accorded high ecological value," said Mathieu Ducrocq, an expert with the ANPN.

But the protection is very far from complete.

'Law not applied'

In many cases, Gabonese law gives precedence to those already using the land, which means that plots exchange hands by mutual agreement and the National Agency of Urban Planning simply records the transaction, said survey engineer Pierre Bongolo, a former government advisor. "There are a few pieces of legislation (on urban planning) but they're not applied. For example, the law provides for studies on the environmental impact (of new buildings), but these aren't being done," he said.—AFP ■

Suspected substandard walls found at 15 schools in quake-hit Osaka

OSAKA — A local education board said Friday inspections have found 15 elementary and junior high schools in quake-hit Osaka had concrete block walls that may not meet safety requirements.

The board inspected 59 city-run schools in Takatsuki, where a 9-yearold girl was crushed to death when a school wall collapsed during a magnitude-6.1 earthquake on Monday. Concrete walls at 11 schools were found to have been built in a similar manner, according to the Takatsuki education board.

The substandard walls at 15 schools — nine elementary schools and six junior high schools — are expected to be removed within two to three weeks, the education board said.

The inspections were conducted on Tuesday at 41 elementary schools and 18 junior high schools.

School authorities

were warned three years ago about the substandard concrete wall that collapsed onto Rina Miyake, the local education board said.

Disaster prevention adviser Ryoichi Yoshida informed the girl's school and the local education board in 2015 about the danger of the wall made from concrete blocks piled up high around the swimming pool of Juei Elementary School.

The victim was on her way to school when the quake rocked western Japan. The education board told a press conference that following the warning, it checked the wall in February 2016. After visually assessing the structure and hitting it with a stick, board staff judged it to be safe. But the board also said the two officials who inspected the wall did not have any architectural qualifications.-Kyodo News

ABC to air 'Roseanne' spinoff sans controversial star

LOS ANGELES—The US television network ABC announced Thursday it would launch a spinoff of the "Roseanne" series without its embattled star, who was dropped earlier this month after unleashing a racist rant.

Many of the cast's original actors would perform their roles in the new 10-episode series tentatively titled "The Conners," slated to premiere this fall, the network said in a statement.

Roseanne Barr — 65 and a vocal Trump supporter who has tweeted far-right and conspiracy theorist views — would have no financial or creative involvement in the show, the network said.

"Roseanne" was one of the few depictions of working-class life on US television, and also of Trump supporters, who have

been largely ignored by Hollywood.

The sitcom was the most watched series of the year on

major American TV networks before its sudden cancellation.

Nonetheless, the network axed "Roseanne" after its lead

actress Roseanne Barr used Twitter to liken Valerie Jarrett, an African American former White House aide, to an ape.

Barr apologized for her racist tweet but ABC condemned it as "abhorrent" and "inconsistent with our values" in announcing the cancellation of her show.

But the network approved the new spinoff, saying "The Conners" stories demonstrate that families can always find common ground through conversation, laughter and love."

The new sitcom would begin "after a sudden turn of events" that would force the family "to face the daily struggles of life... in a way they never have before," ABC said.

"The spinoff will continue to portray contemporary issues that are as relevant today as they were 30 years ago," the

network said.

In a joint statement, cast members including John Goodman and Laurie Metcalf said "we have received a tremendous amount of support from fans of our show, and it's clear that these characters not only have a place in our hearts, but in the hearts and homes of our audience."

We all came back last season because we wanted to tell stories about the challenges facing a working-class family today," the cast members said.

"We are so happy to have the opportunity to return with the cast and crew to continue to share those stories through love and laughter."

"Roseanne" had been off the air for 21 years before its reboot, which premiered with almost 22 million viewers, according to ABC. —AFP ■

Suspect arrested in killing of rapper XXXTentacion

MIAMI — A Florida man with a criminal history has been arrested over the shooting death of rapper XXXTentacion, with more suspects being sought, authorities said Thursday.

Dedrick Williams, 22, was pulled over Wednesday evening in Pompano Beach north of Miami and arrested on a warrant for first-degree murder, the Broward County Sheriff's Department said.

The warrant said Williams shot XXXTentacion on Monday outside a motorcycle store. Williams has not yet entered a plea to the allegations.

"Detectives are seeking additional suspects. The investigation continues," the department said on Twitter.

The sheriff's department said that they were treating the killing of the chart-topping rapper, whose bag was snatched from his car, as part of a robbery.

Williams has been repeatedly arrested and had been on probation through 2021 over car theft, according to law enforcement records.

Facebook and Instagram pages linked to Williams

showed a deep interest in tattoos and money, with the suspect often fanning himself with spread stacks of dollars. Pictures from 2014 showed the inside of a gun store.

"Don't piss me off u will never know wats next," he wrote on Facebook shortly before his arrest.

It was not immediately clear if Williams had previous contact with XXXTentacion, 20, whose real name was Jahseh Ofrey. XXXTentacion led a violent life himself with multiple arrests. He had been awaiting trial for beating his former girlfriend while she was pregnant, an episode which led to calls to shun his music.

But despite the domestic violence charges and a lack of traditional publicity, XXXTentacion debuted at number one this year on the US chart with his second album, entitled "?."

Rappers including Kendrick Lamar hailed XXXTentacion as a unique talent, with his dark, lo-fi hip-hop full of raw expressions of his depression and suicidal tendencies.— AFP ROME —Italian journalist Roberto Saviano, who lives under armed guard since publishing his mafia best-seller "Gomorra" in 2006, lashed out Friday at the country's new far-right interior minister for threatening to lift his police protection.

Matteo Salvini of the anti-immigration League party on Thursday said there was a need for the relevant authorities "to evaluate whether there is still a risk" to Saviano's life from figures in the criminal underworld who made death threats against him over the book.

"It seems to me that he spends a lot of time abroad," Salvini told a radio station, adding it was necessary to examine "how the Italian people's money is being spent".

His remarks drew a blunt response from Saviano, who has been very critical of Salvini's populist party and its anti-immigrant policies.

"Idiot," he said in a video posted on his Facebook page, saying he was "happy to be one of his enemies".

The 38-year-old writer on Friday also denounced the "foul" atmosphere in Italy since the new populist government took office on 31 May, warning that anyone could be targeted in an interview with the Corriere Della Sera newspaper.

"If Matteo Salvini wants to vent his worst impulses against me and the immigrants, anyone who thinks they are safe is wrong. Yesterday it was the immigrants, today it's me and tomorrow, it'll be you," he said. Salvini's latest controversial remarks followed hot on the heels of another earlier crisis sparked by his refusal to offer safe harbour to a boat carrying 630 migrants who had been rescued off the coast of Libya.

"We have an interior minister who, rather than protecting citizens, wants to put them in danger," said Pier Luigi Bersani, one of the leaders of the leftwing Democratic and Progressive Movement (MDP). — AFP ■

Sex, gender and social change: Cambodian blogger tackles taboos

PHNOM PENH— Sex toys, infidelity and penis size are generally hush hush topics in conservative Cambodia, but not on a taboo-busting video blog called "A Dose of Cath" that unabashedly wrestles with the risqué, drawing both applause and abuse in the patriarchal country.

Hosted on Facebook, the show by a 23-year-old Cambodian woman tackles the finer points of sex education, women's health and gender imbalances in a country where the #MeToo movement has barely registered.

A recent episode on a wellknown 19th-century Cambodian poem that used to be taught in schools and advises women not to laugh too loudly gained nearly 350,000 views.

The videos feature Catherine Harry, the pen name of the self-described feminist who featured in Forbes' 2018 "30 under 30" list of outstanding leaders and entrepreneurs in Asia.

Having ditched her birth name more than 10 years ago,

Cath is following in the footsteps of other Cambodian writers and media personalities turning to blogs and social media to make a name for themselves. But few have waded so deeply into the sensitive social issues that Cath confronts in short nofrills monologues filmed in her Phnom Penh apartment. "What I expect to get from what I'm doing, from my videos, is to start a conversation, because the topics that I talk about, people don't really talk about," she told AFP. Those include premarital sex, whether to watch porn in a relationship, cervical cancer and sexual assault.

Statistics point to an urgent need for such conversations in a kingdom where one in five Cambodian men surveyed as part of a 2014 UN study admitted to having committed rape. Cath has shared her own #MeToo experiences to help spur debate, but said those who speak out in Cambodia face victim-blaming or even violence.

"If a woman talks about her experiences of sexual assault or sexual harassment, she will be rejected by society, by her family, her friends," she said.

And while 65 per cent of all businesses in Cambodia are run by women, the country's major political and financial institutions are still male-dominated.

Hun Sen, the long-serving prime minister who has been in power for over three decades, has tried to court the youth through his own Facebook page and graduation speeches.—AFP

US designer Spade mourned at hometown funeral

CHICAGO— Friends and loved ones said goodbye Thursday to American fashion designer Kate Spade at a funeral in Kansas City, Missouri, birthplace of the 55-year-old who committed suicide two weeks ago.

Spade was one of the biggest names in American fashion, known especially for her sleek handbags.

An additional tragedy befell the family hours before the late-afternoon service, as Spade's "heartbroken" 89-yearold father died at his home in the Midwestern US city.

The family said Earl Brosnahan had been in failing health.

Mourners gathered at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish Redemptorist Church on a rainy, dark afternoon, but The Kansas City Star reported that some of Spade's school friends carried signature handbags of the designer whose use of bright colors and prints proved a hit with career women. "She was incredibly kind and had a very memorable laugh," a friend, Margie Morrison, told The Star.

Before getting into fashion

design, Spade worked as a journalist, including a stint as accessories editor at Mademoiselle magazine. She launched her Kate Spade label in 1993 with husband Andy Spade.

More than a decade ago, Spade sold her business and later launched the luxury line Frances Valentine. Spade's body was found 5 June in her New York apartment. "She was actively seeking help for depression and anxiety over the last five years, seeing a doctor on a regular basis and taking medication for both depression and anxiety," her husband Andy Spade said in a statement carried by The New

York Times earlier this month.

Spade's father died Wednesday night surrounded by family, according to a statement the family released to The Star.

"He had been in failing health of late and was heartbroken over the recent death of his beloved daughter," the family said. —AFP

Paramount working on third 'Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles' film

LOS ANGELES—Paramount is developing third "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles" movie.

The studio has started the work on the project, two years after "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles: Out of the Shadows" disappointed at the box office.

Andrew Dodge has been roped in to write the script.

Michael Bay, Andrew Form, and Brad Fuller are producing the film through their Platinum Dunes production company.

According to Variety, the studio is aiming to reboot the franchise with the third "Ninja Turtles" project.

The films are based on the comic by Kevin Eastman and Kevin Laird about wisecracking turtle superheroes named after the Renaissance artistes Michelangelo, Raphael, Leonardo and Donatello, using ninja skills acquired from a radioactive New York City rat.

The previous two movies starred Pete Ploszek as Leonardo, Alan Ritchson as Raphael, Noel Fisher as Michelangelo and Jeremy Howard as Donatello. —PTI ■

Brazil edge towards World Cup knockouts after Costa Rica late show

SAINT PETERSBURG -Philippe Coutinho and Neymar broke down dogged Costa Rica in injury time on Friday, sealing a 2-0 win for Brazil that propels the five-time champions towards the World Cup last 16.

The Central Americans looked likely to hold on for a hardearned draw, particularly after Neymar had a penalty award chalked off by referee Bjorn Kuipers after he consulted the Video Assistant Referee.

But Coutinho and Neymar finally broke through, scoring in the $91^{\rm st}$ and $97^{\rm th}$ minutes to put Tite's side on the brink of the knockout stages.

At the final whistle, Neymar sat down on the grass and wept, with the emotion of victory hitting home after the tense Group E contest at the Saint Petersburg Stadium.

Neymar started despite limping out of training on Tuesday with a hurt ankle, which the Brazilian FA said was sustained as a result of snapping Swiss defenders.

After a ponderous start, Brazil enjoyed a gradual crescendo during the first period but their dominance in possession was



not reflected in chances created.

Neymar faced the most devoted of markers in Costa Rica's Cristian Gamboa, the Brazilian spending most of the half hopping over scything tackles or dodging past a barging shoulder.

It was a compelling battle. One sumputous Neymar flick sent the ball flying over Gamboa's head and later he made an excellent run onto Coutinho's pass, only to squander the chance with a heavy touch.

Marcelo, Coutinho and Neymar, however, hardly make for the most conscientious combination out wide and when Johan Venegas ran clear down the right, his pullback should have been converted by Celso Borges, who skewed past the post.

Brazil might have had a penalty when Oscar Duarte blocked Paulinho at a corner and Costa Rica rode their luck again after the break, as Neymar, Gabriel Jesus and Coutinho all went close.

Jesus's header crashed against the crossbar and after some excellent work by Paulinho, Coutinho's follow-up hit the ever-present Gamboa on the line.

Neymar fired over from Paulinho's cutback and Coutinho shot straight at Keylor Navas

after, again, Paulinho had teed it up.

With 20 minutes left, Gamboa made his first mistake and Neymar should have capitalised. A sloppy touch allowed the striker to cut inside from the left but his bending finish curved around the outside of the post.

There was more drama to come. With just over 10 minutes left, Neymar's turn prompted Giancarlo Gonzalez to lose his footing and put his arm across the Brazilian's chest.

Neymar arched back as if losing his balance before falling to the ground. Kuipers pointed to the spot but after reviewing the video replay, reversed his decision.

Frustration brewed but Costa Rica's resistance was finally ended in the 91st minute.

Marcelo's deep cross was kept alive by Roberto Firmino and a loose touch by Jesus dribbled perfectly into Coutinho's path. Six yards out, he sidefooted home.

Costa Rica conceded again right at the death. Substitute Douglas Costa squared for Neymar to finally find the net. —AFP ■

World Cup fans soak up history in Russia's Volgograd

VOLGOGRAD — Iceland and among the bloodiest in history. Nigeria fans soaked up the "awe-inspiring" history of Volgograd on Friday as they explored the World Cup city that was annihilated during World War II.

Nazi Germany's advance into Russia began exactly 77 years ago, on 22 June, 1941, and was halted in the city, then known as Stalingrad, in February 1943.

The Battle of Stalingrad is

It raged for almost six

months and when it was over the city was in ruins and around two million Nazi and Soviet soldiers and civilians had lost their lives.

"It's real history," Iceland fan Heidar Gudjonsson told AFP as he walked up the 200 steps to the "Mamayev Kurgan" monument to the battle -- a giant sculpture of a woman with sword raised. "It's shocking and this

monument is something else, it's extremely dramatic. It's awe-inspiring and it really has an influence on you," added Gudjonsson.

The memorial complex to the battle is set on a hill overlooking the new 45,500-seat Volgograd Arena and includes the towering 85-metre statue known as "The Motherland Calls", and a hall where an eternal flame to the city's fallen burns. —AFP ■
