STATE COUNSELLOR and Union Minister for Foreign Affairs Daw Aung San Suu Kyi received Dr. Surakiart Sathirathai, Chairman of the Advisory Board of the Committee for Implementation of Recommendations on Rakhine State, and its members at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Nay Pyi Taw, at 11 a.m. on 2 April. Dr. Surakiart Sathirathai was accompanied by Advisory Board members Urban Ahlin, U Win Mra, U Tun Myat, U Khin Maung Lay, U Hla Myint and Dr. Khin Nyo.

The Union Minister maintained that the outcomes and proposals made during this national-level political dialogue would be discussed and confirmed at the Union Peace Conference—21st Century Panglong third session, which was agreed at the 7th Joint Implementation and Coordination Meeting (JICM) to be held in Nay Pyi Taw by the end of April or early May. The UPDJC meeting had designated five main topics to be discussed at the Union Peace Conference-21st Century Panglong third session, namely, politics, economics, social environment, security, and land and environmental policy. Matters that were not submitted in the Union Peace Conference—21st Century Panglong

second session were agreed to be discussed as priority matters in this session. The aim was to ensure NMSP's race-oriented political dialogue at the national level in Mon State was successful, as it has signed the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (NCA). It was the responsibility of the government to assist the NMSP in holding this dialogue, as it had signed the NCA with full trust and understanding. If there were additional requirements, the NRPC would coordinate and provide assistance, said the Union Minister.

At the meeting, Union Peace Commission Secretary Lt-Gen (retired) Khin Zaw Oo explained the ToR and SOPs related to the national-level political dialogue; UPDJC EAO Group representative U Khun Myint Htun discussed achieving good outcomes from the Mon national-level political dialogue through an open and frank discussion, and UPDJC political party group representative U Thu Wai suggested working with a single mind and body to uphold the national-level political dialogue.

Also, NMSP Secretary General Nai Aung Min explained the arrangements made to successfully hold the race-oriented political dialogues at the national level, while Mon State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan commented on providing the necessary support and assistance. Vice President U Myint Swe attends 16th regular meeting with Myanmar entrepreneurs

THE 16th regular meeting of the Private Sector Development Committee (PSDC) and Myanmar entrepreneurs was held at the meeting hall of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UM-FCCI) in Lanmadaw Township, Yangon, yesterday morning. Vice President U Myint Swe, Chairman of PSDC, attended the meeting and delivered a speech.

Present at the meeting were PSDC Vice Chairman and Union Minister for Commerce Dr. Than Myint, Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Kyaw Win, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein, deputy ministers U Aung Htoo and U Win Maw Tun, Yangon Region ministers, officials from the five work committees, the UMFCCI president and members, permanent secretaries and directors-general, and the chairmen and secretaries of the Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Sugar and Sugar Related Products Merchants and Manufacturers Association. Yangon Region Commodity Exchange, Myanmar Fisheries Federation and Myanmar Seafarer Employment Services Federation.

In his speech, U Myint Swe said the day's meeting was the 16th between the PSDC and Myanmar entrepreneurs. The PSDC was formed with 20 members on 24 October 2016 and has five main components that are being successfully implemented by its five work committees.

The meetings between PSDC and Myanmar entrepreneurs started in December 2016 and the 15th meeting

was held in March 2018. Some 230 difficulties faced by the businesses were raised at the meeting. All were answered by the relevant ministries, states/ regions governments and the five work committees, through the UMFCCI.

If the responses are thought to be inadequate, arrangements are made for the matter to be raised with one of the committee's relevant ministries, the Ministry of Commerce, through the UMFCCI, and with the arrangement of the committee, the businesses that raise the matter can resolve the matter directly with the relevant ministries under a private-public dialogue programme.

The government has established and is implementing a 12-point economic policy for the development of the country's economy. It is trying its best to overcome the difficulties faced by the businesses. As of 20 March of the 2017-2018 fiscal year (FY), the total foreign investment was US\$6.1 billion, exceeding the 2017-2018 FY target of \$6 billion. Job opportunities were created through this foreign investment.

Looking at the status of foreign trade, as of 23 March of the 2017-2018 FY, the trade value was more than \$32.5 billion, which was \$4.3 billion more than the value achieved in the same period last FY. Of this, \$26.6 billion was from the private sector, with its participation in the trade volume amounting to 82 per cent.

In the export sector, a record value of more than \$14 billion was reached through the export of rice, cereal, raw rubber and garments. Some 3.52 million tonnes of rice were exported.

The difficulties and losses faced by the pulses and bean

farmers because of India's import restrictions are being resolved through diplomatic channels and coordination at the ministry level. Farmers are advised to select and grow crops that are economically beneficial.

The company registration fee has been reduced from Ks1 million to Ks500,000 from June 2016. Starting 1 April 2018, it has been further reduced to Ks250,000.

Arrangements are also being made to enable company registration procedures to be conducted online round-theclock. This is part of the 10 indexes in the Ease of Doing Business Report under the index "Starting a Business".

As union ministers, deputy ministers and officials were in attendance, the five organisations that attended the meeting were urged to openly discuss and submit the difficulties faced, said the Vice President.

Next, Dr. Than Myint explained the implementation status of the Ministry of Commerce in the export/import and investment sectors.

Later, Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Kyaw Win explained the strengthening of the financial market, reduction of waste in budget, strengthening of the private banking sector, the small and medium enterprise development policies during the twoyear period, as well as the ongoing works on developing the tax, investment, agriculture and livestock sectors.

Following this, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein explained the status of increasing the flow of commodity and foreign investment, and the works conducted for the development of agriculture, fish and other livestock sectors.

Later, UMFCCI President U Zaw Min Win explained the status of sector-wise works conducted for the development of the private sector.

The Vice President, union ministers, the Yangon Region Chief Minister and officials then coordinated on the discussions and matters raised by the officials of the Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Sugar and Sugar Related Products Merchants and Manufacturers Association, Yangon Region Commodity Exchange, Myanmar Fisheries Federation and Myanmar Seafarer Employment Services Federation.

The meeting came to a close after the Vice President delivered a closing speech. — Myanmar News Agency

Peace group collected more than 20,000 signatures for peace

MEMBERS of the Wheelchair Train for Peace have now collected more than 20,000 signatures for a petition for peace during their trip between Kawthoung and Mawlamyine, said U Thein Lwin, general secretary of the Myanmar Christian Fellowship of the Blind.

The group which includes 10 disabled people and 10 blind people left Kawthoung on 18 March and arrived at Hpa-An in Kayin State on Manday the group travelled about 600 miles by wheelchair. Occasionally the group would have to stop to repair something on their wheelchairs; these minor setbacks did not deter their ambition to continue their travels.

"Tomorrow we depart to Myawady after setting up a signboard in Kawkareik. The rest of our itinerary after Myawady is Hpa-An, Thaton, Kyaikto, Bago and Yangon," said Maung Wuntha, an organizer of the peace group.

The peace group has scheduled to travel 850 miles from the southern city of Kawthoung in Thaninthayi Region to Yangon. The itinerary of the group includes 21 towns they plan to stop in.

Their final destination is in front of the Yangon City Hall on 8 April. They have also been collecting local people's comments and opinions as well as setting up signboards during their trip. Man arrested for drug trafficking in Mohnyin, Kachin State

THE township police arrested a man in connection with a drug trafficking case in Mohnyin Township in Kachin State on 1 April, the police reported.

The man was identified as Han Lin, alias Phoe Pu, 27.

After receiving a tip, members of the anti-drug squad conducted a surprise raid at Phoe Pu's home in Phayagon Ward in Hsemile Village around 9 a.m. on that day.

The police seized opium powder weighing nine grams and 140 yaba pills from his bedroom. The police have confiscated the drugs, which have an estimated value of more than Ks1 million.

The police have filed charges against three persons under the Narcotic Drugs and **Psychotropic** Substances Law. Further investigations are being conducted by the police to arrest others involved in the case.—GNLM

Agricultural exports up by \$171 million

THE export of agricultural products before the end of this fiscal year (FY) increased by US\$171 million, compared with the same period last FY, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The export of agricultural products last FY reached \$2.758 billion, but the export of the same products this FY, from last April to 23 March of this year, increased to \$2.929 billion, the vast majority being exported by the private sector.

Among the seven export categories, the trade value of only the forestry sector decreased. The overall exports were valued at \$13.848 billion, an increase of \$2.49 billion, as against last year.

According to official figures, the country exported animal products worth \$51.091 million, marine products worth more than \$666.995 million, mineral products worth \$1.701 billion, manufactured goods worth \$6.297 billion,

forest products worth \$201 million, and miscellaneous products worth more than \$2 billion.

As part of its plan to promote the country's economy, the government is making sustained efforts to raise the exports in each sector. Myanmar conducts trade with ASEAN member states, East Asian countries, some European nations and African states, mainly via sea. -Shwe Khine 🔳

Under the Civil Service Academy, there is A Civil Services Academy – CSA (1) based on Education and Competency Training Approach. We are conducting the Post Graduate Diploma in Public Administration (PGDPA), Post Graduate Diploma in Civil Service Management (PGDCSM), English Language Training (ELT), Master in Public Administration (MPA), Human Resource (HR) Development classes and Blended e-Learning Lecture. We have formed Technical Working Group (TWG) and Training Needs Analysis (TNA) Task Force which can supervise necessary curriculum and syllabus with the help of expertise from Ministry for Educations, EU (GOPA) and other experts from abroad.

In addition to Civil Service Training Policy and Civil Service Training Scheme, plans are under way to open Generalized Training Programme, Specialized Training Programme, and Civil Service Academy Training Centre in Nay Pyi Taw.

With the assistance of JICA, we are planning to set up e-Government system and Civil Service Core Database System very soon.

As a result, we have successfully conducted Advanced Diploma Course (ADC) on March 12, 2018.

In order to upgrade the standard of teaching and training centre, cooperation are being made to sign MoU, MoA, Minutes of Discussion and Technical Note with Akamai University from the U.S, EDS Business School in Malaysia, JICA and Chinese Academy of Governance (CAG) respectively.

The UCSB by providing the required Civil Service frameworks, will be able to support the decentralization process and for the States and Regions to assume more human resources management functions.

As we all know – the civil service training and capacity development require an uplift to meet international standards and to become more effective and responsive to the needs of our staff.

Thus, the UCSB has established a Civil Service Academy that would allow for training and development so that we can upgrade some training methods

Better transport improves living standards of people

HE transport and electricity sectors are the most important infrastructural challenges in Myanmar that must be improved to enhance the lives of the people and attract foreign investment.

There are places in the country that cannot be accessed during certain seasons.

The 587km Yangon-Mandalay Expressway runs from Yangon to Mandalay, bypassing Bago, Taungoo, Nay Pyi Taw and Meiktila.

During the two-year period of the incumbent government, efforts were stepped up to improve the country's transport sector. The Ministry of Transport and Communications trained some 3,954 marine engineers and registered 38 ocean-going cargo ships, 64 coastal passenger ships, 1,544 coastal cargo ships, 6,178 inland waterway cargo ships, and 69,207 boats with engine power under 20 horsepower.

The Myanmar Coastal and Inland Water Transport Service Licence Law was amended, and the 2017 bill amending the

Myanmar Merchant Shipping Act was also submitted to the President.

While prioritising the improvement of the road transport sector, the ministry also upgraded the Yangon Port, which is the main port among the nine ports along the coastline of Myanmar.

The Yangon Port handles more than 90 per cent of the international waterway trade, and during the two-year period, a total of six wharves were constructed.

At the Thilawa port area, two multipurpose terminals of international standards were constructed with loans from Japan, and more than 50 per cent of the work has been completed.

A container barge was constructed with the assistance of Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) to transport goods along the Ayeyawady River between Yangon and Mandalay, as well as transport containers between Thilawa Port and Shwe Pyi Tha Shwe

Me (Black Gold) Port

In the two-year period, US\$3.6 million was used to dredge the Yangon River, so that ocean-going ships can enter the port with ease.

Meanwhile, a logistics master plan was drawn up with the assistance of JICA in 2016, and it will be completed in March 2018.

It will reduce the urban-rural gap, as well as help reduce poverty. It is being done to review the projects in the national transport master plan.

Importance of microfilming in Archives

N 1790, Archives Nationales (National Archives) are thought to have originated in France where the French Revolution was waging a war against the monarchy. As the Revolution was a period of time, the national documents were kept by the Archives Act of the government. In 1835 under the reign of Queen Victoria of England, Public Records Act was promulgated to set up the National Archives. National Archives were set up in Russia in 1918 despite the financial difficulties after the Russian **Revolution.** National Archives were set up in the United States in 1934 despite economic crises between 1929 to 1935.

The earliest establishment of National Archives in Asia started in the Philippines in 1892. National Archives in India were established in

1891 by sending a telegram even though national archives in the world were normally established by the respective National Archives Acts. In Myanmar, National Archives Act was promulgated on 15 March, 1972 under the Revolutionary Council Order No. 97 by the Ministry of National Planning and Finance at the Office of Ministries(Old Secretariat).

Microfilming

Microfilming , a process of photographic reproduction of documents and images to be kept in the Archives, was believed to have started during World War One. At that time, carrier pigeons were used to send messages from one place to the other; messages tied to the pigeon's leg or neck were usually sent and easily seen by enemies who intercepted these pigeons, thereby destroying the messages on the way. So, messages sent by means of microfilming came to the fore; messages in microfilms were received in full. Microfilming was thus essential for archives for security reasons.

Reprography

The Department for National Archives in many countries As the typewriters were in- has used reprography for repro-

ments, written materials, drawings, designs and microfiches by using light rays or photographic means including offset printing , microfilming and photography. Written documents have become yellowish and rotted away gradually due to oxidation with acid oozed out from the writing paper. In the production of wood

Therefore written words have become too fainted for researchers to read. Microfilms, microfiches, cassettes, tapes, oral history, videos, compact discs, gramophone records, slide films and non-paper archives are normally stored in the Department of National Archives. Local and international researchers can easily download data from microfilm and microfiche machines and National Archives Information System by using database.

UNION Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr. Win Myat Aye and the Advisory Board of the Committee for Implementation of the Recommendations on Rakhine State held talks yesterday in Nay Pyi Taw over several issues for Rakhine State.

The Advisory Board was led by Dr. Surakiart Sathirathai, Former Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs of Thailand.

education, free movement, stepped up efforts for national scrutinization process, arrangements for media coverage, closing of IDP camps opened in 2012, plans for launching a pilot project for development in Rakhine State joining hands with the ASEAN community, plans for promoting humanitarian assistance and rehabilitation and resettlement in Rakhine State joining hands with UN agencies and partner countries and contribution of expertise and businesses from Thailand in development of Rakhine State.--Myanmar News Agency

Rakhine State Chief Minister meets Turkish Ambassador in Sittway

RAKHINE State Chief Minister U Nyi Pu met with Ambassador of Turkey to Myanmar Mr. Kerem Divanlioglu and party at the State Chief Minister meeting hall yesterday morning.

During the meeting the ambassador told of coming to help in the challenges occurring in Rakhine State and to learn of the present situation. The Chief Minister replied that after the occurrence of the conflict, works were being done for resettlement, receiving (of returnees), long term development and stability. In the matter of receiving (returnees) reception centres were prepared and readied as directed by the State Counsellor. More than six hundred houses were already constructed in Hla Pho Khaung Transit camp for more than 30,000 returnees. After temporarily staying in the transit camp, the returnees will be settled in their original place or a place nearest to where they previously stay. This is according to the bilateral agreement. Income generation measures are arranged so that returnees earn income while building their own houses. The government has formed a committee to receive and resettle returnees and Deputy Minister for Ministry of State Counsellor's Office is organizing this by basing in **Rakhine State.** Arrangements are made for the long term existence of the returnees as well as for the long term existence and socio-economic develop of ethnic nationals. If such development works are conducted, there wouldn't be conflicts anymore and the two societies can live for long said the Chief Minister. —Tin Tun (IPRD)

Public Sector Wage Bill compares favourably with similar countries: Myanmar-WB joint report

THE size of Myanmar's public sector wage bill compares favourably with lower middle income countries, according to a report released yesterday. The Myanmar Pay, Compensation and Human Resource Management Review was jointly conducted by the Government of Myanmar and the World Bank.

The review, supported by Denmark, Australia and UK-DFID, under the Myanmar Multi Donor Trust Fund, presents a comprehensive picture of the Myanmar civil service pay, compensation and human resource management systems, and their strengths and challenges.

"Myanmar is in a good place on the public sector wage bill, and there are opportunities to ensure compensation levels remain attractive and sustainable," said Shabih Ali Mohib, programme leader at the World Bank. "However, it is important to manage it prudently to ensure fiscal sustainability and to incentivise performance in the public sector."

The report also recommends developing better forecasting systems that take into account the trade-offs of higher pay versus more staff, and targeted compensation increases versus across-the-board adjustments; developing a centralised electronic payroll with possible linkages to financial management and human resource information systems; regularly monitoring the government's ability to recruit, retain and deploy skilled personnel; and updating the rates of operational expenses to enable staff to do their jobs.

"It is only the first step on the long journey of evidence-based reforms to manage the wage bill and the performance of the Myanmar civil service," said U Tun Tun Naing, Myanmar's Permanent Secretary at the Ministry of Planning and Finance.

"This is the most thorough review of Myanmar's civil service so far," said Peter Lysholt Hansen, Denmark's Ambassador to Myanmar. "I encourage the World Bank to play an active role in supporting the Government of Myanmar to translate the recommendations into reality."

The review was undertaken from 2015 to 2017, in response to the Government of Myanmar's request for the World Bank's advice on compensation and human resource policies that reflect country-specific circumstances.—GNLM

The Ministry of Health and Sports is designating 4-anilino-N-phenethylpiperidine (ANPP) and N-phenethyl-4-piperidine (NPP) as controlled precursor chemicals, and has added them as serial numbers 16 and 17 in section 1, sub-section (a) table (1) of the notice 1/2012. —Myanmar News Agency

Lavrov says spy poisoning could be 'in interests' of UK govt

MOSCOW, Russia — Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov on Monday suggested that the poisoning of a former double agent could benefit the British government by distracting attention from problems around Brexit.

The 4 March attack on Skripal and his daughter in the English city of Salisbury has triggered a wave of tit-for-tat expulsions of diplomats between the West and Russia and sent relations plunging to new post-Cold War lows.

"This could be in the interests of the British government which found itself in an uncomfortable situation having failed to fulfil promises to its electorate about the conditions for Brexit," Lavrov said at a press conference in Moscow, referring to Britain's planned departure from the European Union.

Lavrov also suggested that the poisoning of Sergei Skripal and his daughter "could also be in the interests of the British special forces who are known for their abilities to act with a licence to kill".

"There could be a whole number of reasons and none of them can be ruled out," Lavrov said. Britain has said it was "highly likely" that Russia was responsible for the attack using a nerve agent developed in the USSR, a view backed up by its Western allies.

But Russia denies any involvement and has called for Britain to give it access to the nerve agent used.

Lavrov insisted that "serious experts "and "leaders of a whole number of countries" are questioning Britain's account of the crime.

"Britain, I think, will not manage to evade answering these questions. Because they are already only too obvious and it's only too obvious that our British colleagues have lost their sense of reality."

Lavrov complained that the British authorities have still not give consular access to "our citizens," and that the situation had not changed despite Yulia Skripal's improved condition.

He said he hoped Sergei Skripal would "also follow this example" and get better.

Lavrov also denied the attack was "sophisticated," saying that if it had been, the victims would have died immediately.

"If I understand correctly, sophisticated attacks usually lead to instant death," he said. —AFP ■

Russia's Tagil missile unit rearmed with advanced Yars systems — commander

MOSCOW — The Tagil unit of the Russian strategic missile forces has been completely rearmed with Yars (NATO reporting name: SS-29 Yars) ground-mobile intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) systems, commander of the Russian strategic missile forces Sergei Karakayev said on 29 Thursday.

"We have completed rearming of the Tagil and Novosibirsk missile units with the Yars ground-mobile ballistic missile systems," he said, adding that ongoing missile troops drills in the Sverdlovsk region will make it possible to assess the possibilities of new arms and hardware.

According to Karakayev, rearming of the Irkutsk and Yoshkar-Ola missile units continues. Rearming of Bologoye and Barnaul units will begin in 2020.

In November 2017, Karakayev said that all missile divisions operating mobile missile systems would be rearmed with the Yars missile system by 2026.

The Yars is a mobile or stationary missile system with a solid-propellant interconti-

nental ballistic missile (ICBM) containing a multiple warhead. It was developed on the basis of the Topol-M missile system in the 2000s by the Moscow Institute of Thermal Technology under the guidance of Chief Designer Yuri Solomonov.

The first test launch was performed from the Plesetsk testing range towards the Kura ground on 29 May, 2007.

Russia started to deploy Yars missile systems in December 2009 when the system was accepted by the Strategic Missile Force for operational evaluation.—Tass

Italy president to start talks on government creation

ROME, ITALY — Italian President Sergio Mattarella on Wednesday begins key talks with parties on forming a government after last month's election left a hung parliament.

The stalemate puts the spotlight on Mattarella, who has the power to name a prime minister, but it is still unclear whether rivals can find common ground for a coalition government or whether another vote will be needed.

Luigi Di Maio's anti-establishment Five Star Movement (M5S) garnered more than 32 per cent of the vote in the 4 March poll but the anti-immigration League of Matteo Salvini leads a coalition that got 37 per cent of the ballot.

The parliament is divided between the right-wing coalition, the M5S and the centre-left Democratic Party.

Late last month, the right-wing coalition and the M5S cobbled a deal on the respective positions of speaker for both the lower and upper houses of parliament but they have not come to any pact on forming a government.

Far-right leader Salvini said on Thursday that his aim was for his party to take power.

"We are open to dialogue with everybody but we are not subordinate to anyone given that the centre-right coalition got the most votes," he said on Facebook.

Di Maio meanwhile stressed that his M5S was the party with the most seats.

"The biggest challenge facing us however is forming a government while respecting the popular will," he said.

Mattarella will on Wednesday hold preliminary talks with the speakers from the two houses of parliament as well as with his predecessor Giorgio Napolitano before launching further discussions with the parties. The consultations could

last weeks.

The left has so far refused to enter into coalition talks with either the M5S or the right-wing coalition. —AFP ■

Gull found in northeastern Japan with object lodged in head

SENDAI — A black-headed gull birds protection act. with what appears to be a paper dart lodged in its head has been found in a canal in the northeastern Japan prefecture of Miyagi, local officials said on Monday.

The bird continues to eat and fly, and does not appear weakened. The prefectural government is considering capturing the bird to remove the object and the local police have launched an investigation into a possible violation of the wild

After police received a report from a resident on March 28 about the gull in a canal in Ishinomaki, a prefectural government official confirmed the bird had a 10-centimeter-long object lodged in the left side of its head.

"I have never seen a gull in such a state. It looks painful and I feel sorry" for the bird, 8-year-old Minkai Matsuo said. - Kyodo News

Kim Jong Un 'deeply moved' by K-pop concert: KCNA

SEOUL — North Korean leader Kim Jong Un smiled, clapped and said he was "deeply moved" by a rare performance by South Korean K-pop stars in Pyongyang, state media reported on Monday.

The high profile appearance of Kim and his wife, former singer Ri Sol Ju, at the concert was unusual as his authoritarian regime typically struggles to prevent any infiltration of the South's pop culture among his isolated people.

Kim, the first North Korean leader ever to attend a show by entertainers from the South, shook hands with the performers and "expressed his deep thanks to them," the North's official KCNA news agency reported.

"He said that he was deeply moved to see our people sincerely acclaiming the performance, deepening the understanding of the popular art of the South's side," KCNA said.

The visit by the South's entertainers, seen as part of a cultural charm offensive by Seoul, comes as a diplomatic thaw gathers pace on the peninsula ahead of a landmark inter-Korean summit later this month.

Kim said he was likely to be busy "because of his complicated political program early in April," so he was glad to make it to the concert which he

credited with bringing the "spring of peace".

The 120-member South Korean group — 11 musical acts as well as dancers, technicians and martial artists — gave one concert on Sunday with another set for Tuesday.

Kim and his wife were seen clapping their hands during the twohour Sunday event, which was also attended by Kim's younger sister, Kim Yo Jong, and the North's ceremonial head of state Kim Yong Nam.

The concert at the elaborately decorated 1,500-seat East Pyongyang Grand Theatre ended with a standing ovation by the packed audience after a finale featuring all the stars singing a song about unification.

'They sang along'

One of the most closely watched acts was Red Velvet, part of the South's hugely popular K-pop phenomenon that has taken audiences in Asia and beyond by storm.

Even leader Kim acknowledged that there had been "so much interest in whether I'd come to see Red Velvet or not". The five-member girlband — known for its signature K-pop mix of upbeat electronic music and high-voltage choreography — performed two of their hits, "Bad Boy" and "Red Flavour".

"The North's audience applauded our performance much louder than we expected and even sang along to our songs... it was a big relief," band member Yeri told reporters.

The ongoing rapprochement was triggered by the South's Winter Olympics, to which the North's leader Kim Jong Un sent athletes, cheerleaders and his sister as

an envoy.

Kim followed up by agreeing to a summit with South Korean President Moon Jae-in, and offering a face-to-face meet with US President Donald Trump. Kim also met Chinese President Xi Jinping in Beijing last week during his first overseas trip.

The inter-Korean summit, the third such event after meetings in 2000 and 2007, will be held on 27 April.

No date has been set for the US-North Korean summit although it is expected before the end of May.—AFP

China punishes local officials for environmental offences

BEIJING — China's environmental watchdog said on Monday that it has held several local officials from Hubei Province accountable for environment-related misconduct.

Officials in Huanggang, Hubei were found to have turned a deaf ear to violations of environmental protection rules, including excessive emissions and insufficient pollution control equipment at enterprises, said the Ministry of Ecology and Environment.

The officials held accountable were publicly named and given Party disciplinary or administrative punishment.

Their misconduct was discovered by a central environmental inspection team in Hubei last August.

The inspection was part of China's campaign to fight pollution and environmental damage, as decades of growth have left the country with smog, polluted water, and contaminated soil. Four rounds of inspections have been launched since 2016, covering all provincial-level regions and achieving satisfactory results. More than 20,000 Chinese have been held accountable for environment-related misconduct over the past two years.—Xinhua

"Prominent dignitaries from the world of cinema gathered here in round table to debate and ascertain the importance of film heritage and its preservation. The word film has suddenly lost its charm ; for there does not seem to be any need to shoot films on film. It's all digital now.

"It was known as the 'film industry', they were known as 'film stars'. So in the complete absence of that medium and that product, it would be quite in order to call ourselves 'robotic genes' or words of similar sound — 'digi act' or 'digi digi' — It would be an issue that would need consideration," Bachchan wrote on his blog.

The actor said celluloid film is the "original format" and it is necessary to bring it back into business. "It (film) had greater aesthetic value , and its preservation, an essentially for posterity of having an original , than one that has been manufactured digitally. Digital is a derivative of the original film print so how would you feel if a xerox copy of a Picasso were to be up at a museum for attention and appreciation.

Film is the original, digital format is not and in time to come this format may retire too," he added. Bachchan also shared few pictures from the round table event, which was attended by Shah Rukh Khan and Kamal Haasan among others.—PTI

Their on 19 May wedding at Windsor Castle, west of London, will be filled with flowers that are naturally in bloom at that time of the year, Harry's official residence said.

Floral designer Philippa Craddock said the happy couple worked closely with her on the planning.

"The process has been highly collaborative, free-flowing, creative and fun," she said. "Working with them has been an absolute pleasure."

The displays in St George's Chapel will be created using locally sourced foliage, much of which will be taken from the gardens and parkland of Windsor Great Park and the Crown Estate lands held by the monarch — Harry's grandmother Queen Elizabeth II.

The sprays will include branches of beech, birch and hornbeam and reflect the wild and natural landscapes from which many of the plants will be drawn.

"The final designs will represent them as a couple, which I always aim to achieve in my work, with local sourcing, seasonality and sustainability being at the forefront," Craddock said.

Former army officer Harry, 33, is fifth in line to the throne. He announced his engagement to 36-year-old Markle in November.

Christians mark Easter at Jerusalem's Holy Sepulchre

JERUSALEM — Hundreds of pilgrims filed into Jerusalem's Church of the Holy Sepulchre - believed to be the site of Jesus's resurrection - for Easter celebrations on Sunday.

Western Christians marked Easter on Sunday, while eastern Orthodox Christians do so on 8 April.

The eastern Orthodox marked Palm Sunday on April 1 and also held mass at the church in Jerusalem's Old City, with worshippers holding palm fronds as is tradition.

Some worshippers prostrated over a stone — where they believe Jesus's body was anointed before his burial near the towering wooden doors at the entrance to the church.

The church is built at the site where Christians believe Jesus was crucified, buried and resurrected. A recently renovated ornate shrine within the church surrounds the cave where Jesus is believed to have been buried.

Easter marks the day when Christians believe the miracle of his resurrection occurred.

Catholic Archbishop Pierbattista Pizzaballa held mass at the church on Sunday

morning near the shrine over the cave, entering dressed in the traditional purple Easter robe.

He made reference to the Middle East's numerous conflicts in his homily, saying "our times are marked by death".

"Easter is the ability to come back and look at our history in the light of the promise of life that takes place today," he said. "Yes, today, at Easter, we announce a life that death can no more extinguish."

On Friday, Christians traced the route of the Stations of the Cross through the Old City, which pass through the traditional sites of Jesus's condemnation up to his crucifixion.

In March 2017, renovations to the 19th-century shrine covering Jesus's tomb were unveiled following a \$3.7 million project that restored its stones to their original reddish-yellow and reinforced the heavily visited site.

The Greek Orthodox, Armenian and Roman Catholic denominations share custody of the church, but disputes between the three had led to renovations being delayed for decades.—AFP

Nepali Sherpa aims for record 22nd Everest summit

A Nepali Sherpa is hoping to summit Mount Everest for a record-breaking 22nd time next month, during the busy climbing season that each year sees hundreds of climbers reach the top of the world.

But to Kami Rita Sherpa, who has worked as a guide on Everest for over two decades, climbing to 8,848 metres (29,029 feet) is a job not a record-shattering feat.

"I did not start climbing to set a world record. But in the course of my work in the guiding industry this is going to be my 22nd ascent. It wasn't for any competition," Kami Rita told AFP in Kathmandu before setting out for the mountain.

When 48-year-old Kami Rita first summited Everest in 1994, he was one of just 49 climbers to reach the peak.

Last year, 634 people made it to the top.

Over the last two decades the booming number of climbers on Everest has created a lucrative mountaineering industry in both China and Nepal, which share the peak.

In Nepal — home to eight of the world's highest peaks — the climbers provide vital income: last year the impoverished country netted over \$4 million in permit fees on Everest alone.

Each year hundreds of climbers begin gathering at the foot of the world's highest peak from early April, turning the base camp into a bustling nylon tent city.

They spend nearly two months on the mountain to acclimatise to the harsh high altitude environment before attempting to reach the summit in May.

Spring is the busiest time of year on the mountain as the winds and temperatures are

more forgiving than at other times of the year. But nonetheless each spring Everest claims a few lives: last year seven climbers died on the mountain.

The rapid growth in the climbing industry has also led to fears of deadly overcrowding on Everest, with the mountain opening up to more people as competition between expedition organisers has seen the costs plummet. The cheapest operators charge clients around \$20,000 to take them to the top of the world, a quarter of the amount demanded by the most expensive.—AFP

LONDON - Former Manchester United manager Tommy Docherty has poked fun at Jose Mourinho's ego by claiming the Old Trafford boss would eat himself if he was made of chocolate.

Docherty knows what it takes to succeed at United after spending five years in charge in the 1970s and he doesn't believe Mourinho has the right stuff to thrive in Manchester.

Mourinho won the League Cup and Europa League with United last season and his side are currently second in the Premier League and in the FA Cup semi-finals.

But the former Chelsea and Real Madrid boss has been criticised for his side's style of play and for his treatment of certain players. Docherty is convinced Mourinho doesn't help himself with an arrogant attitude, telling

BBC Radio 5 Live's Sportsweek programme: "If he was made of chocolate he would eat himself.

"You can't argue with his record but I think he goes over the score with his criticism of players.

"He has bought those players and then he is criticising them afterwards. "I would be amazed if he lasts any length of time at Manchester United. I don't think the board will put up with his antics."

Docherty, who was speaking in an interview to mark his 90th birthday later this month, led United to promotion from the second tier in 1975 and won the FA Cup in 1977. In another dig at Mourinho, he said he prefers to watch Manchester City, who can secure the Premier League title with victory over United in next weekend's derby.—AFP

Kane fit to make Spurs bench at Chelsea

LONDON-Harry Kane made a quick return from ankle ligament damage to take his place on the Tottenham Hotspur bench for Sunday's crucial Premier League clash with Chelsea.

Tottenham can take a huge step towards securing Champions League football next season should they win in the league at Stamford Bridge for the first time since 1990 to open an eight-point lead over fifth-placed Chelsea.

Kane has been sidelined for three weeks since suffering the injury in a 4-1 win at Bournemouth. However, fears the England international's place at the World Cup could even be put at risk proved unfounded with Spurs boss Mauricio Pochettino hailing his "fantastic" recovery.

Son Heung-min takes Kane's place up front hoping to continue his hot streak of seven goals in his last five games for Spurs.

Chelsea have injury problems of their own as goalkeeper Thibaut Courtois misses out.

He is replaced by Willy Caballero, who conceded six as Spain ran riot over Argentina in midweek. Cesc Fabregas returns in midfield, whilst Alvaro Morata is handed the chance to net his first Premier League goal in 2018 after ending his three-month goal drought as Chelsea beat Leicester in the FA Cup quarter-finals a fortnight ago.—AFP

Dele double sparks Spurs delight as wait for Chelsea win ends

LONDON- Dele Alli scored twice in four second-half minutes as Tottenham Hotspur beat Chelsea 3-1 on Sunday to end a 28-year wait for a Premier League win at Stamford Bridge.

Defeat for the hosts all but ends Chelsea's hopes of Champions League football next season as Spurs opened up an eightpoint lead over their closest challengers for fourth place.

Ending their long wait for a win at their London rivals is just the latest sign of the progress made under Mauricio Pochettino as Spurs look set to seal a place in the Champions League for a third straight season.

And it was even more impressive as they came from behind as a huge error from captain Hugo Lloris gifted Alvaro Morata the opening goal.

Christan Eriksen's wonder strike levelled in first-half stoppage time, before Alli took centre stage to end a barren run by his standards with two smart finishes just after the hour mark.

Spurs could even afford the luxury of doing the damage without Harry Kane, who made his return from a three-week layoff with ankle ligament damage 16 minutes from time.

Alli was pushed into a more advanced role than his usual roving role behind Kane and had the

first chance but couldn't direct hour mark. Eriksen's cross goalwards.

Chelsea were the side far more in desperate need of the points and that began to show as the first-half developed.

Willian and Victor Moses forced Lloris into comfortable saves, whilst Marcos Alonso also saw a goal ruled out for offside.

However, the French number one was clearly at fault when the opener arrived on the half

Morata hadn't scored in the Premier League since Boxing Day, but no one has scored more headed goals in the league this season and he was left with the easiest of tasks to nod into an empty net as Lloris flapped at Moses's cross.

Symbolic Spurs win

Lloris was also far from secure when he parried Alonso's driven cross back into the danger area and relied on Jan Vertonghen to make a crucial clearance.

Eriksen's shooting ability from long range had been Spurs' only real threat before the break. Willy Caballero, deputising

for the injured Thibaut Courtois, got a strong hand to the Dane's first warning shot.

However, Caballero was helpless when Eriksen's fierce dipping effort clipped the bar

on its way past him in first-half stoppage time.

The Argentine goalkeeper was forced into a brilliant save from another long-range effort, this time from Son Heung-min, on the hour mark as Spurs started to take control.

And two minutes later they led when Alli brilliantly controlled Eric Dier's long pass before slotting inside Caballero's near post.

Alli had scored just two goals in his previous 19 games in 2018 but soon had as many in four minutes as Spurs set the seal in a hugely symbolic win.

Son was again denied by Caballero but Alli pounced on the pinball inside the Chelsea area before slotting into the bottom corner.

Chelsea manager Antonio Conte kicked a water bottle into his dugout with the frustration of a man who knows his days in charge.

Failure to make the top four is likely to seal the Italian's fate no matter what comes of Chelsea's run to the semi-finals of the FA Cup.

However, Spurs too are in the last four and on this evidence are more likely to end their wait for a trophy under Pochettino, particularly with Kane back to lead the line.—AFP
